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## A BILL

To end the epidemic of gun violence and build safer communities by strengthening Federal firearms laws and supporting gun violence research, intervention, and prevention initiatives.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE; TABLE OF CONTENTS.**

## 1 **TITLE I—FIREARM LICENSING**

### 2 **SEC. 101. LICENSE TO OWN FIREARMS AND AMMUNITION.**

- 3 (a) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 44 of title 18, United  
 4 States Code, is amended by adding at the end the fol-  
 5 lowing:

1 **“§ 935. License to own firearms and ammunition**

2 “(a) IN GENERAL.—Except as otherwise provided in  
3 this section, it shall be unlawful for any individual who  
4 is not licensed under this section to knowingly purchase,  
5 acquire, or possess a firearm or ammunition.

6 “(b) ELIGIBILITY.—An individual shall be eligible to  
7 receive a license under this section if the individual—

8 “(1) has attained 21 years of age;

9 “(2) has completed training in firearms safety,  
10 including—

11 “(A) a written test, to demonstrate knowl-  
12 edge of applicable firearms laws;

13 “(B) hands-on testing, including firing  
14 testing, to demonstrate safe use of a firearm;

15 “(C) as part of the process for applying for  
16 such a license—

17 “(i) has submitted to a background  
18 investigation and criminal history check of  
19 the individual, including a background  
20 check using the National Instant Criminal  
21 Background Check System, to ensure  
22 that—

23 “(I) the individual is not prohib-  
24 ited from possessing a firearm under  
25 subsection (g) or (n) of section 922;  
26 and

1                   “(II) the transfer of a firearm to  
2                   the individual is not prohibited under  
3                   section 922(d); and

4                   “(ii) has submitted a photograph of  
5                   the individual;

6                   “(D) has not been determined by a court,  
7                   in accordance with subsection (c)(5), to be un-  
8                   suitable to be issued a Federal firearm owner’s  
9                   license; and

10                   “(E) is not otherwise prohibited by Fed-  
11                   eral, State, Tribal, or local law from possessing  
12                   a firearm.

13                   “(c) ESTABLISHMENT OF FEDERAL FIREARM  
14                   OWNER’S LICENSE.—

15                   “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General shall  
16                   issue a Federal firearm owner’s license to any indi-  
17                   vidual who is eligible under subsection (b).

18                   “(2) ISSUANCE OF LICENSE OR NOTICE OF DE-  
19                   NIAL.—Not later than 40 days after the date on  
20                   which an individual submits an application for a  
21                   Federal firearm owner’s license under this section,  
22                   the Attorney General shall—

23                   “(A) determine whether the individual is  
24                   eligible to possess a license under this section;  
25                   and

1                   “(B) based on the determination under  
2                   subparagraph (A)—

3                   “(i) issue a Federal firearm owner’s  
4                   license to the individual; or

5                   “(ii) provide written notice to the in-  
6                   dividual of—

7                   “(I) the determination that the  
8                   individual is ineligible to possess such  
9                   a license based on the requirements  
10                  described in subsection (b), which  
11                  shall include an explanation for the  
12                  determination; or

13                  “(II) a petition filed under para-  
14                  graph (5).

15                  “(3) EXPIRATION.—A Federal firearm owner’s  
16                  license issued under this section shall expire on the  
17                  date that is 10 years after the date on which the li-  
18                  cense was issued.

19                  “(4) RENEWAL OF LICENSE.—

20                  “(A) IN GENERAL.—A Federal firearm  
21                  owner’s license issued under this section may be  
22                  renewed at the end of the 10-year period de-  
23                  scribed in paragraph (3).

1           “(B) REQUIREMENTS.—The process for  
2 renewal of a Federal firearm owner’s license  
3 under subparagraph (A) shall include—

4           “(i) an up-to-date background inves-  
5 tigation and criminal history check of the  
6 individual; and

7           “(ii) a recent photograph of the indi-  
8 vidual.

9           “(C) ISSUANCE OF RENEWAL OR NOTICE  
10 OF DENIAL.—Not later than 40 days after the  
11 date on which an individual submits an applica-  
12 tion for a renewal of a Federal firearm owner’s  
13 license under this paragraph, the Attorney Gen-  
14 eral shall—

15           “(i) issue a renewed Federal firearm  
16 owner’s license to the individual; or

17           “(ii) provide written notice to the in-  
18 dividual of—

19           “(I) the determination that the  
20 individual is ineligible to possess such  
21 a license based on the requirements  
22 described in subsection (b), which  
23 shall include an explanation for the  
24 determination; or

1                                   “(II) a petition filed under para-  
2                                   graph (5).

3                   “(5)       ATF       DETERMINATION       OF  
4                   UNSUITABILITY.—

5                   “(A) IN GENERAL.—The Director of the  
6                   Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Ex-  
7                   plosives may file a petition, which shall contain  
8                   a written statement of the reasons supporting  
9                   the finding required under subparagraph (D),  
10                  in an appropriate district court of the United  
11                  States that—

12                   “(i) an individual who has applied for  
13                   a Federal firearm owner’s license, or re-  
14                   newal thereof, under this section be denied  
15                   the request for such license; or

16                   “(ii) a previously issued Federal fire-  
17                   arm owner’s license be suspended or re-  
18                   voked.

19                   “(B) NOTICE.—Any petition filed under  
20                   subparagraph (A) shall include written notice to  
21                   the individual who requested, or is in possession  
22                   of, the Federal firearm owner’s license, as the  
23                   case may be, describing the facts and cir-  
24                   cumstances justifying the petition.

1           “(C) HEARING.—Not later than 90 days  
2 after the date on which a petition is filed under  
3 subparagraph (A), the court shall conduct a  
4 hearing.

5           “(D) FACTORS TO DETERMINE  
6 UNSUITABILITY.—Not later than 15 days after  
7 the date on which a hearing is conducted under  
8 subparagraph (C), the court shall find that an  
9 individual is unsuitable to possess a Federal  
10 firearm owner’s license if, based on a prepon-  
11 derance of the evidence, there exists—

12           “(i) reliable, articulable, and credible  
13 information that the individual has exhib-  
14 ited or engaged in behavior to suggest the  
15 individual could potentially create a risk to  
16 public safety or significant risk of suicide;  
17 or

18           “(ii) other existing factors that sug-  
19 gest that the individual could potentially  
20 create a risk to public safety or significant  
21 risk of suicide.

22           “(E) NOTICE OF DETERMINATION.—If a  
23 court finds an individual is unsuitable to pos-  
24 sess a Federal firearm owner’s license, the  
25 court shall notify the applicant in writing, set-

1           ting forth the specific reasons for such deter-  
2           mination.

3           “(6) REVIEW.—A determination of the Director  
4           of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and  
5           Explosives or a district court of the United States  
6           under this subparagraph may be appealed to the ap-  
7           propriate court of the United States.

8           “(d) EXCEPTIONS.—

9           “(1) PREVIOUSLY POSSESSED FIREARMS.—Sub-  
10          section (a) shall not apply to the possession of any  
11          firearm or ammunition by an individual who other-  
12          wise lawfully possessed the firearm or ammunition  
13          under Federal law on the date on which the Attor-  
14          ney General begins issuing Federal firearm owner’s  
15          licenses under this section.

16          “(2) STATE LICENSES.—

17                 “(A) IN GENERAL.—Subsection (a) shall  
18                 not apply to an individual in a State if the At-  
19                 torney General determines that the State—

20                         “(i) has in effect a process for issuing  
21                         a State firearm owner’s license to eligible  
22                         individuals in the State that is substan-  
23                         tially similar to the requirements of sub-  
24                         section (b); and

1           “(ii) provides to the Attorney General  
2           real-time validity information relating to  
3           firearm owner’s licenses issued by the  
4           State, for inclusion in the database de-  
5           scribed in section (f).

6           “(B) PUBLICATION OF LIST OF QUALI-  
7           FYING STATES.—

8           “(i) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 2  
9           years after the date of enactment of the  
10          Gun Violence Prevention and Community  
11          Safety Act of 2023, the Attorney General  
12          shall publish a list of States that have in  
13          effect a process described in subparagraph  
14          (A).

15          “(ii) UPDATED LIST.—The Attorney  
16          General shall update the list described in  
17          clause (i) immediately upon determining  
18          that a State should be included on or re-  
19          moved from the list.

20          “(3) LICENSED DEALERS, MANUFACTURERS,  
21          AND IMPORTERS.—Subsection (a) shall not apply to  
22          an individual who is a licensed dealer, licensed man-  
23          ufacturer, or licensed importer.

24          “(4) AGENCIES AND LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFI-  
25          CERS.—

1           “(A) IN GENERAL.—Subsection (a) shall  
2 not apply to—

3           “(i) the importation for, manufacture  
4 for, sale to, transfer to, or possession by  
5 the United States or a department or  
6 agency of the United States or a State or  
7 a department, agency, or political subdivi-  
8 sion of a State, or a sale or transfer to or  
9 possession by a qualified law enforcement  
10 officer employed by the United States or a  
11 department or agency of the United States  
12 or a State or a department, agency, or po-  
13 litical subdivision of a State, for purposes  
14 of law enforcement (whether on or off  
15 duty), or a sale or transfer to or possession  
16 by a campus law enforcement officer for  
17 purposes of law enforcement (whether on  
18 or off duty); or

19           “(ii) the importation for, or sale or  
20 transfer to a licensee under title I of the  
21 Atomic Energy Act of 1954 (42 U.S.C.  
22 2011 et seq.) for purposes of establishing  
23 and maintaining an on-site physical protec-  
24 tion system and security organization re-  
25 quired by Federal law, or possession by an

1 employee or contractor of such licensee on-  
2 site for such purposes or off-site for pur-  
3 poses of licensee-authorized training or  
4 transportation of nuclear materials.

5 “(B) DEFINITION.—For purposes of sub-  
6 paragraph (A), the term ‘campus law enforce-  
7 ment officer’ means an individual who is—

8 “(i) employed by a private institution  
9 of higher education that is eligible for  
10 funding under title IV of the Higher Edu-  
11 cation Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. 1070 et  
12 seq.);

13 “(ii) responsible for the prevention or  
14 investigation of crime involving injury to  
15 persons or property, including apprehen-  
16 sion or detention of persons for such  
17 crimes;

18 “(iii) authorized by Federal, State, or  
19 local law to carry a firearm, execute search  
20 warrants, and make arrests; and

21 “(iv) recognized, commissioned, or  
22 certified by a government entity as a law  
23 enforcement officer.

24 “(e) PROHIBITION OF STRAW PURCHASING.—It shall  
25 be unlawful for any person to willfully use a valid Federal

1 or State firearm license to purchase a firearm or ammuni-  
2 tion on behalf of another individual, regardless of whether  
3 the other individual has a valid Federal or State firearm  
4 license.

5 “(f) PENALTIES.—Any person who violates sub-  
6 section (a) or (e) shall be imprisoned not more than 2  
7 years, fined in accordance with this title, or both.

8 “(g) DATABASE.—The Attorney General shall estab-  
9 lish an electronic database, which shall be accessible by  
10 Federal, State, local, and Tribal law enforcement agencies  
11 and licensed dealers, through which a licensed dealer may  
12 verify the validity of a Federal firearm owner’s license  
13 issued under this section.

14 “(h) REVOCATION OF LICENSES.—

15 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General shall  
16 revoke the Federal firearm owner’s license issued to  
17 an individual under this section upon the occurrence  
18 of any event that would have disqualified the indi-  
19 vidual from being issued or renewed a Federal fire-  
20 arm owner’s license under this section or for a viola-  
21 tion of a restriction provided under this section.

22 “(2) REQUIRED NOTICE.—Upon revocation of a  
23 Federal firearm owner’s license under paragraph  
24 (1), the Attorney General shall provide written no-

1           tice of such revocation to the individual to whom the  
2           license was issued.

3           “(3) APPEAL OF REVOCATION.—

4                   “(A) IN GENERAL.—An individual who has  
5           the Federal firearm owner’s license of the indi-  
6           vidual revoked under this subsection may ap-  
7           peal the revocation determination to the Direc-  
8           tor of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Fire-  
9           arms, and Explosives.

10                   “(B) REQUIREMENT.—Not later than 14  
11           days after the date on which an individual ap-  
12           peals a revocation determination under sub-  
13           paragraph (A), the Director of the Bureau of  
14           Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives  
15           shall conduct a hearing on the appeal.

16                   “(C) NOTICE OF DETERMINATION.—The  
17           Director of the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco,  
18           Firearms, and Explosives shall provide written  
19           notice of the determination made after a hear-  
20           ing under subparagraph (B) regarding the ap-  
21           pealed revocation to the individual.

22                   “(D) APPEAL.—If the Director of the Bu-  
23           reau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explo-  
24           sives determines after a hearing under this  
25           paragraph to uphold the revocation, the deter-

1           mination may be appealed to an appropriate  
2           district court of the United States.

3           “(i) ANNUAL BACKGROUND INVESTIGATIONS.—The  
4 Attorney General shall conduct, not less frequently than  
5 annually, a background investigation of each individual to  
6 whom a Federal firearm owner’s license is issued under  
7 this section to ensure that—

8                   “(1) the individual is not prohibited from pos-  
9           sessing a firearm under subsection (g) or (n) of sec-  
10          tion 922 or under State law; and

11                   “(2) the transfer of a firearm to the individual  
12          is not prohibited under section 922(d).

13           “(j) ANNUAL REPORT.—Not later than 1 year after  
14 the date of enactment of this section, and each year there-  
15 after, the Attorney General shall submit a report to Con-  
16 gress on the implementation of this section and rec-  
17 ommendations, if any, for improvements of the system re-  
18 quired to be established under this section.

19           “(k) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There  
20 are authorized to be appropriated to the Attorney General  
21 such sums as are necessary to carry out this section.”.

22           (b) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of sections  
23 for such chapter is amended by adding at the end the fol-  
24 lowing:

“935. License to own firearms and ammunition.”.

1 (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made by  
2 subsections (a) and (b) shall take effect on the date that  
3 is 2 years after the date of enactment of this Act.

4 (d) REGULATIONS.—Not later than 1 year after the  
5 date of enactment of this Act, the Attorney General shall  
6 promulgate regulations to carry out section 935 of title  
7 18, United States Code, as added by subsection (a), in-  
8 cluding a regulation requiring that any firearm manufac-  
9 tured after the effective date described in subsection (c)  
10 of this section be legibly and conspicuously engraved or  
11 cast with the date on which the firearm was manufac-  
12 tured.

13 **SEC. 102. STATE FIREARMS LICENSING.**

14 (a) IN GENERAL.—Title I of the Omnibus Crime  
15 Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (34 U.S.C. 10101  
16 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end the following:

17 **“PART PP—FIREARMS LICENSING**

18 **“SEC. 3061. DEFINITIONS.**

19 “(a) IN GENERAL.—In this part—

20 “(1) the term ‘covered license’ means a—

21 “(A) firearms license; or

22 “(B) firearms dealer license;

23 “(2) the term ‘extreme risk protection order’—

24 “(A) means a written order, issued by a  
25 State court or signed by a magistrate that, for

1 a period not to exceed a time frame established  
2 by the State—

3 “(i) prohibits the individual named in  
4 the order from having under the custody or  
5 control of the individual, purchasing, pos-  
6 sessing, or receiving a firearm or ammuni-  
7 tion; and

8 “(ii) requires that any firearm or am-  
9 munition under the custody or control of  
10 the individual be removed; and

11 “(B) does not include a domestic violence  
12 protection order, as defined in section 2266 of  
13 title 18, United States Code;

14 “(3) the term ‘prohibited individual’ means an  
15 individual who is categorically ineligible to receive a  
16 covered license;

17 “(4) the term ‘suitable’ means that an indi-  
18 vidual does not create a risk to public safety; and

19 “(5) the term ‘thorough background check’  
20 means a Federal and State background check, which  
21 may include a fingerprint-based background check.

22 “(b) PROHIBITED INDIVIDUALS.—For purposes of  
23 this part, a State—

1           “(1) shall establish standards for categorizing  
2           an individual as a prohibited individual for purposes  
3           of receiving a covered license; and

4           “(2) in establishing standards with respect to a  
5           covered license under paragraph (1), shall take into  
6           consideration whether limitations may be warranted  
7           based on—

8                   “(A) criminal history;

9                   “(B) whether an individual has been—

10                           “(i) deemed a danger to himself or  
11                           herself or other individuals by a court or  
12                           authorized administrative body; or

13                           “(ii) committed to a hospital or insti-  
14                           tution as a danger to himself or herself or  
15                           other individuals;

16                   “(C) age;

17                   “(D) legal residency;

18                   “(E) military dishonorable discharges;

19                   “(F) whether an individual is subject to a  
20                   permanent or temporary protection order or has  
21                   ever been convicted of a misdemeanor crime of  
22                   domestic violence;

23                   “(G) outstanding arrest warrants;

24                   “(H) status as a fugitive;

1                   “(I) renunciation of United States citizen-  
2                   ship; and

3                   “(J) other factors relevant to the suit-  
4                   ability of a license holder.

5 **“SEC. 3062. GRANTS AND CONDITIONS.**

6                   “(a) GRANTS AUTHORIZED.—The Assistant Attorney  
7 General may make grants to States to implement or main-  
8 tain firearms and firearms dealer licensing requirements.

9                   “(b) DURATION OF GRANTS.—A grant under sub-  
10 section (a) shall be for a period of 3 fiscal years.

11                   “(c) USE OF FUNDS FOR FIREARMS AND FIREARMS  
12 DEALER LICENSING.—

13                   “(1) ACTIVITIES.—Amounts received under a  
14 grant under subsection (a) shall be used for the im-  
15 plementation or maintenance of firearms and fire-  
16 arms dealer licensing requirements, which shall in-  
17 corporate and implement the elements described in  
18 paragraph (2).

19                   “(2) ELEMENTS.—The elements described in  
20 this paragraph are those providing that—

21                   “(A) an individual shall have a firearms li-  
22 cense—

23                   “(i) at the time of the purchase, rent-  
24 al, or lease of a firearm or purchase of am-  
25 munition; and

1                   “(ii) during the entire period of own-  
2                   ership or possession of a firearm or ammu-  
3                   nition;

4                   “(B)(i) an individual who (including the  
5                   owner or operator of a business that) sells,  
6                   rents, or leases a minimum number of firearms,  
7                   or sells ammunition, during a calendar year  
8                   shall obtain a firearms dealer license; and

9                   “(ii) the State shall establish the minimum  
10                  number of firearms for purposes of clause (i),  
11                  which may not be higher than 10 per calendar  
12                  year;

13                  “(C) the chief of police or the board or of-  
14                  ficer having control of the police department of  
15                  a local government, or a designee within the  
16                  same department, shall function as the licensing  
17                  authority;

18                  “(D) for an application for issuance or re-  
19                  newal of a firearms license, the licensing au-  
20                  thority shall—

21                         “(i) conduct a thorough background  
22                         check, which may include—

23                                 “(I) conducting an interview with  
24                                 the applicant;

1                   “(II) requiring the submission of  
2                   letters of reference stating that the  
3                   applicant is of sound mind and char-  
4                   acter; and

5                   “(III) any other requirements the  
6                   State determines relevant; and

7                   “(ii) make a determination of suit-  
8                   ability;

9                   “(E) a first-time firearms license applicant  
10                  shall complete safety training;

11                  “(F) for an application for issuance or re-  
12                  newal of a firearms dealer license, the licensing  
13                  authority shall conduct an investigation into the  
14                  criminal history of the applicant, which may in-  
15                  clude—

16                   “(i) an interview with the applicant;

17                   “(ii) a thorough background check;

18                  and

19                   “(iii) any other requirements the  
20                  State determines relevant;

21                  “(G) the State shall establish appropriate  
22                  application processes for covered licenses con-  
23                  sistent with Federal, State, and local law;

7 “(J) the State shall establish judicial re-  
8 view processes by which any applicant for or  
9 holder of a covered license may, within a rea-  
10 sonable time period, petition to obtain judicial  
11 review of a revocation, suspension, or denial of  
12 the issuance or renewal of a covered license;

13 “(K) the State shall establish—

14 “(i) standards and a process under  
15 which a family member of an individual  
16 who the family member fears is a danger  
17 to himself, herself, or others may petition  
18 for an extreme risk protection order; and

19 “(ii) standards for the termination or  
20 extension of an order described in clause  
21 (i);

22 “(L) the State shall establish processes  
23 under which—

24 “(i) an individual whose covered li-  
25 cense is revoked or suspended, or whose

1 application for issuance or renewal of a  
2 covered license is denied, shall surrender or  
3 transfer all firearms and ammunition that  
4 are or would have been covered by the li-  
5 cense; and

6 “(ii) an individual who is subject to  
7 an extreme risk protection order or a do-  
8 mestic violence protection order, as defined  
9 in section 2266 of title 18, United States  
10 Code, shall surrender or transfer all fire-  
11 arms and ammunition in the possession of  
12 the individual;

13 “(M) the State shall establish requirements  
14 with which a firearms dealer licensee must com-  
15 ply, which—

16 “(i) shall include requirements relat-  
17 ing to—

18 “(I) the location at which the li-  
19 censee conducts firearm or ammuni-  
20 tion transactions;

21 “(II) the manner in which the li-  
22 censee records firearm or ammunition  
23 transactions;

24 “(III) background checks for em-  
25 ployees of the licensee; and

1 “(IV) any other matter that the  
2 State determines appropriate; and

3 “(ii) may include requirements that a  
4 licensee—

5 “(I) maintain a permanent place  
6 of business—

7 “(aa) that is not a resi-  
8 dence; and

9 “(bb) at which the licensee  
10 conducts all firearms or ammuni-  
11 tion transactions;

12 “(II) submit to mandatory record  
13 and inventory inspections by a licens-  
14 ing authority;

15 “(III) maintain a sales record  
16 book at the permanent place of busi-  
17 ness described in subclause (I) in ac-  
18 cordance with standards established  
19 by the State;

20 “(IV) conduct a pre-employment  
21 background check on each potential  
22 employee to determine the suitability  
23 of any potential employee who may  
24 have direct and unmonitored contact  
25 with a firearm or ammunition; and



1           “(R) a dealer of firearms or ammunition  
2 shall notify the licensing authority when pre-  
3 sented with an invalid or expired firearms li-  
4 cense;

5           “(S) any firearms licensee whose firearm  
6 or ammunition is lost or stolen shall report the  
7 loss or theft to the licensing authority and  
8 State authorities within a reasonable time  
9 frame and in a manner established by the  
10 State;

11           “(T) an individual holding a firearms li-  
12 cense or firearms dealer license shall renew the  
13 license on a time frame established by the  
14 State;

15           “(U) an individual may not use the fire-  
16 arms license of the individual to purchase a  
17 firearm or ammunition for—

18                   “(i) the unlawful use of the firearm or  
19 ammunition by another individual; or

20                   “(ii) the resale or other transfer of  
21 the firearm or ammunition to an unli-  
22 censed individual; and

23           “(V)(i) it shall be unlawful to store or keep  
24 a firearm in any place unless the firearm is se-  
25 cured in a locked container or equipped with a

1 tamper-resistant mechanical lock or other safety  
2 device, properly engaged so as to render the  
3 firearm inoperable by any individual other than  
4 the owner or other lawfully authorized user; and

5 “(ii) for purposes of clause (i), a firearm  
6 shall not be considered to be stored or kept if  
7 carried by or under the control of the owner or  
8 other lawfully authorized user.

9 “(3) SEPARATE AMMUNITION DEALER LICENSE  
10 PERMITTED.—A State that requires a license for  
11 dealing ammunition that is separate from a license  
12 for dealing firearms shall be deemed to have satis-  
13 fied the requirements under paragraph (2) relating  
14 to a firearms dealer license, as that license relates  
15 to the dealing of ammunition, if the State imposes  
16 the same requirements for an ammunition dealer li-  
17 cense as are mandated under that paragraph for a  
18 firearms dealer license, as that license relates to the  
19 dealing of ammunition.

20 “(d) APPLICATION.—To be eligible to receive a grant  
21 under subsection (a), a State shall submit to the Assistant  
22 Attorney General an application at such time, in such  
23 manner, and containing such information as the Assistant  
24 Attorney General may require, including a description of  
25 how the State will use the grant to implement or maintain

1 firearms and firearms dealer licensing requirements that  
2 include the elements described in subsection (c)(2).

3 “(e) ANNUAL REPORT.—Each State receiving a  
4 grant under this section shall submit to the Assistant At-  
5 torney General, for each fiscal year during which the State  
6 expends amounts received under the grant, a report, at  
7 such time and in such manner as the Assistant Attorney  
8 General may reasonably require, that contains—

9 “(1) a summary of the activities carried out  
10 using amounts made available under the grant;

11 “(2) an assessment of whether the activities are  
12 achieving the elements described in subsection  
13 (c)(2); and

14 “(3) such other information as the Assistant  
15 Attorney General may require.

16 “(f) LIMITATIONS ON THE ALLOCATION OF  
17 FUNDS.—Not more than 2 percent of the amount made  
18 available to carry out this section in any fiscal year may  
19 be used by the Assistant Attorney General for salaries and  
20 administrative expenses.

21 “(g) REALLOCATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—A recipi-  
22 ent of a grant under subsection (a) shall return to the  
23 Assistant Attorney General any amounts received under  
24 the grant that are not expended for a purpose described  
25 in this section.”.

22 “(A) beginning on the date on which the data-  
23 base is established under section 935(g), before com-  
24 pletion of the transfer, the licensee verifies, using  
25 the database, that the purchaser has a valid—

1           “(i) Federal firearm owner’s license issued  
2           under section 935; or

3           “(ii) qualifying State firearm license, as  
4           described in section 935(d)(2), for the State in  
5           which the transfer will occur;” and

6           (iii) in subparagraph (C)(ii), as so re-  
7           designated, by striking “subparagraph  
8           (C)” and inserting “subparagraph (D)”;  
9           (B) in paragraph (3)—

10           (i) by striking subparagraph (A);

11           (ii) by redesignating subparagraphs  
12           (B) and (C) as subparagraphs (A) and  
13           (B), respectively; and

2 ful for any person who is not a licensed importer, licensed  
3 manufacturer, or licensed dealer to transfer a firearm to  
4 any other person who is not so licensed, unless a licensed  
5 importer, licensed manufacturer, or licensed dealer has  
6 first taken possession of the firearm for the purpose of  
7 complying with subsection (s).

8       “(B) Upon taking possession of a firearm under sub-  
9 paragraph (A), a licensee shall comply with all require-  
10 ments of this chapter as if the licensee were transferring

9 the transferor has no reason to believe that the  
10 transferee—

11 “(i) will use or intends to use the firearm  
12 in a crime or is prohibited from possessing fire-  
13 arms under Federal, State, Tribal, or local law;

14 “(ii) has committed domestic violence (as  
15 defined in section 40002 of the Violence  
16 Against Women Act of 1994 (34 U.S.C.  
17 12291)) or by the jurisdiction in which the  
18 transfer is occurring or in which the transferee  
19 resides); or

20 “(iii) is subject to a protection order (as  
21 defined in section 2266);

22 “(C) a transfer to an executor, administrator,  
23 trustee, or personal representative of an estate or a  
24 trust that occurs by operation of law upon the death  
25 of another person;

1           “(D) a temporary transfer that is necessary to  
2 prevent imminent death, great bodily harm (includ-  
3 ing such harm to self, family, household members, or  
4 others), domestic violence, dating partner violence,  
5 sexual assault, stalking, or domestic abuse, if the  
6 possession by the transferee lasts only as long as im-  
7 mediately necessary to prevent the imminent death,  
8 great bodily harm, domestic violence, dating partner  
9 violence, sexual assault, stalking, or domestic abuse;

10           “(E) a transfer that is approved by the Attor-  
11 ney General under section 5812 of the Internal Rev-  
12 enue Code of 1986; or

7 paragraphs (B) and (C), the term” and in-

13 years of age or to the possession or use of a  
14 firearm or ammunition by a person who is less  
15 than 21 years of age if the firearm or ammuni-  
16 tion is possessed and used by the person—

17 “(i) in the course of employment, in  
18 the course of ranching or farming related  
19 to activities at the residence of the person  
20 (or on property used for ranching or farm-  
21 ing at which the person, with the permis-

24 (b) TECHNICAL AND CONFORMING AMENDMENTS.—

9           Section 922(z) of title 18, United States Code, is

11           “(4) SECURE GUN STORAGE BY OWNERS.—

12           “(A) OFFENSE.—

13           “(i) IN GENERAL.—Except as pro-  
14 vided in clause (ii), it shall be unlawful for  
15 a person to store or keep any firearm that  
16 has moved in, or that has otherwise af-  
17 fected, interstate or foreign commerce on  
18 the premises of a residence under the con-  
19 trol of the person if the person knows, or  
20 reasonably should know, that—

21           “(I) a minor is likely to gain ac-  
22 cess to the firearm without the per-  
23 mission of the parent or guardian of  
24 the minor; or

1                   “(II) a resident of the residence  
2                   is ineligible to possess a firearm under  
3                   Federal, State, or local law.

4                   “(ii) EXCEPTION.—Clause (i) shall  
5                   not apply to a person if the person—

6                   “(I) keeps the firearm—

7                   “(aa) secure using a secure  
8                   gun storage or safety device; or

9                   “(bb) in a location which a  
10                  reasonable person would believe  
11                  to be secure; or

12                  “(II) carries the firearm on his  
13                  or her person or within such close  
14                  proximity thereto that the person can  
15                  readily retrieve and use the firearm as  
16                  if the person carried the firearm on  
17                  his or her person.

18                  “(B) PENALTY.—

19                  “(i) IN GENERAL.—Any person who  
20                  violates subparagraph (A) shall be subject  
21                  to a \$500 civil penalty per violation and  
22                  shall not be subject to the penalty under  
23                  section 924(a)(1) by reason of subpara-  
24                  graph (D) of that section.

1                   “(ii) ENHANCED PENALTY.—If a per-  
2                   son violates subparagraph (A) and a minor  
3                   or a resident who is ineligible to possess a  
4                   firearm under Federal, State, or local law  
5                   obtains the firearm, the person shall be  
6                   fined under this title, imprisoned for not  
7                   more than 5 years, or both.

8                   “(iii) FORFEITURE OF IMPROPERLY  
9                   STORED FIREARM.—Any firearm stored in  
10                  violation of subparagraph (A) shall be sub-  
11                  ject to seizure and forfeiture in accordance  
12                  with the procedures described in section  
13                  924(d).

14                  “(C) MINOR DEFINED.—In this paragraph,  
15                  the term ‘minor’ means an individual who is  
16                  less than 18 years of age.”.

17 **SEC. 305. SECURE GUN STORAGE OR SAFETY DEVICE FOR**  
18 **ALL FIREARMS.**

19                  Section 922(z) of title 18, United States Code, is  
20                  amended by striking “handgun” each place it appears and  
21                  inserting “firearm”.

1 **SEC. 306. CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY STANDARDS FOR**  
2 **GUN LOCKS AND GUN SAFES.**

3 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Consumer Product Safety  
4 Act (15 U.S.C. 2051 et seq.) is amended by adding at  
5 the end the following:

6 **“SEC. 43. CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY STANDARDS FOR**  
7 **FIREARM LOCKS AND FIREARM SAFES.**

8 “(a) ESTABLISHMENT OF STANDARDS.—

9 “(1) RULEMAKING REQUIRED.—

10 “(A) RULEMAKING PROCEEDING.—Not-  
11 withstanding section 3(a)(5)(E), the Commis-  
12 sion shall initiate a rulemaking proceeding  
13 under section 553 of title 5, United States  
14 Code, within 90 days after the date of the en-  
15 actment of this section to establish—

16 “(i) a consumer product safety stand-  
17 ard for firearm locks; and

18 “(ii) a consumer product safety stand-  
19 ard for firearm safes.

20 “(B) FINAL RULE.—Notwithstanding any  
21 other provision of law, including chapter 5 of  
22 title 5, United States Code, the Commission  
23 shall promulgate final consumer product safety  
24 standards under this paragraph within 12  
25 months after the date on which the Commission

1 initiates the rulemaking proceeding under sub-  
2 paragraph (A).

3 “(C) EFFECTIVE DATE.—Each final con-  
4 sumer product safety standard promulgated  
5 under this paragraph shall take effect 6 months  
6 after the date on which such standard is pro-  
7 mulgated.

8 “(2) REQUIREMENTS FOR FIREARM LOCK  
9 STANDARD.—The standard for firearm locks promul-  
10 gated under paragraph (1) shall require firearm  
11 locks that—

12 “(A) are sufficiently difficult for an unau-  
13 thorized user to de-activate or remove; and

14 “(B) prevent the discharge of the firearm  
15 unless the firearm lock has been de-activated or  
16 removed.

17 “(3) REQUIREMENTS FOR FIREARM SAFE  
18 STANDARD.—The standard for firearm safes promul-  
19 gated under paragraph (1) shall require firearm  
20 safes that reliably secure firearms from unauthor-  
21 ized users, and include reliable security features,  
22 quality, and construction to reliably prevent unau-  
23 thorized users from gaining access to a firearm by  
24 damaging or physically manipulating the safe.

25 “(b) CERTAIN PROVISIONS NOT TO APPLY.—

1           “(1) PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT.—Sections 7 and  
2           9 of this Act do not apply to the rulemaking pro-  
3           ceeding under paragraph (1) of subsection (a).

4           “(2) CHAPTER 5 OF TITLE 5.—Except for sec-  
5           tion 553, chapter 5 of title 5, United States Code,  
6           does not apply to this section.

7           “(3) CHAPTER 6 OF TITLE 5.—Chapter 6 of  
8           title 5, United States Code, does not apply to this  
9           section.

10           “(4) NATIONAL ENVIRONMENTAL POLICY  
11           ACT.—The National Environmental Policy Act of  
12           1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.) does not apply to this  
13           section.

14           “(c) NO EFFECT ON STATE LAW.—Notwithstanding  
15           section 26 of this Act, this section does not annul, alter,  
16           impair, affect, or exempt any person subject to a consumer  
17           product safety standard promulgated under subsection  
18           (a)(1) from complying with any provision of the law of  
19           any State or any political subdivision thereof, except to  
20           the extent that such provision is inconsistent with any  
21           such standard, and then only to the extent of the incon-  
22           sistency. A provision of the law of a State or a political  
23           subdivision thereof is not inconsistent with a consumer  
24           product safety standard promulgated under subsection  
25           (a)(1) if such provision affords greater protection to indi-

1 viduals with respect to firearms than is afforded by such  
2 standard.

3 “(d) ENFORCEMENT.—Notwithstanding subsection  
4 (b)(1), the consumer product safety standards promul-  
5 gated by the Commission under subsection (a)(1) shall be  
6 enforced under this Act as if such standards were con-  
7 sumer product safety standards described in section 7(a).

8 “(e) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

9 “(1) FIREARM.—The term ‘firearm’ has the  
10 meaning given the term in section 921(a) of title 18,  
11 United States Code.

12 “(2) FIREARM LOCK.—The term ‘firearm lock’  
13 means any disabling or locking device that is not  
14 built into the firearm at the time of manufacture  
15 and that is designed to prevent the firearm from  
16 being discharged unless the device has been deacti-  
17 vated or removed.

18 “(3) FIREARM SAFE.—The term ‘firearm safe’  
19 means a container that is advertised to be used to  
20 store a firearm and that is designed to be unlocked  
21 only by means of a key, a combination, or other  
22 similar means.”.

23 (b) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—Section 1 of the  
24 Consumer Product Safety Act is amended by adding at  
25 the end of the table of contents the following:

“Sec. 43. Consumer product safety standards for firearm locks and firearm safes.”.

1           (c) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There  
2 are authorized to be appropriated to the Consumer Prod-  
3 uct Safety Commission \$2,000,000 to carry out the provi-

6 until expended.

1 (b) ELIMINATION OF EXCEPTION FOR LICENSED IN-  
2 DIVIDUALS.—Section 922(q)(2)(B) of title 18, United  
3 States Code, is amended—

4 (1) by striking clause (ii); and

5 (2) by redesignating clauses (iii) through (vii)  
6 as clauses (ii) through (vi), respectively.

7 **TITLE IV—EXTREME RISK**  
8 **PROTECTION ORDERS**

9 **SEC. 401. EXTREME RISK PROTECTION ORDER GRANT PRO-**  
10 **GRAM.**

11 (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

12 (1) ELIGIBLE ENTITY.—The term “eligible enti-  
13 ty” means—

14 (A) a State or Indian Tribe—

15 (i) that enacts legislation described in  
16 subsection (c);

17 (ii) with respect to which the Attorney  
18 General determines that the legislation de-  
19 scribed in clause (i) complies with the re-  
20 quirements under subsection (c)(1); and

21 (iii) that certifies to the Attorney  
22 General that the State or Indian Tribe  
23 shall—

24 (I) use the grant for the purposes  
25 described in subsection (b)(2); and

1 (II) allocate not less than 25 per-  
2 cent and not more than 70 percent of  
3 the amount received under a grant  
4 under subsection (b) for the develop-  
5 ment and dissemination of training  
6 for law enforcement officers in accord-  
7 ance with subsection (b)(4); or

8 (B) a unit of local government or other  
9 public or private entity that—

10 (i) is located in a State or in the terri-  
11 tory under the jurisdiction of an Indian  
12 Tribe that meets the requirements de-  
13 scribed in clauses (i) and (ii) of subpara-  
14 graph (A); and

15 (ii) certifies to the Attorney General  
16 that the unit of local government or entity  
17 shall—

18 (I) use the grant for the purposes  
19 described in subsection (b)(2); and

20 (II) allocate not less than 25 per-  
21 cent and not more than 70 percent of  
22 the amount received under a grant  
23 under this section for the development  
24 and dissemination of training for law

1 enforcement officers in accordance  
2 with subsection (b)(4).

3 (2) EXTREME RISK PROTECTION ORDER.—The  
4 term “extreme risk protection order” means a writ-  
5 ten order or warrant, issued by a State or Tribal  
6 court or signed by a magistrate (or other com-  
7 parable judicial officer), the primary purpose of  
8 which is to reduce the risk of firearm-related death  
9 or injury by doing 1 or more of the following:

10 (A) Prohibiting a named individual from  
11 having under the custody or control of the indi-  
12 vidual, owning, purchasing, possessing, or re-  
13 ceiving a firearm.

14 (B) Having a firearm removed or requiring  
15 the surrender of firearms from a named indi-  
16 vidual.

17 (3) FIREARM.—The term “firearm” has the  
18 meaning given the term in section 921 of title 18,  
19 United States Code.

20 (4) INDIAN TRIBE.—The term “Indian Tribe”  
21 has the meaning given the term “Indian tribe” in  
22 section 1709 of title I of the Omnibus Crime Control  
23 and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (34 U.S.C. 10389).

24 (5) LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER.—The term  
25 “law enforcement officer” means a public servant

1 authorized by Federal, State, local, or Tribal law or  
2 by a Federal, State, local, or Tribal government  
3 agency to—

4 (A) engage in or supervise the prevention,  
5 detection, investigation, or prosecution of an of-  
6 fense; or

7 (B) supervise sentenced criminal offenders.

8 (6) PETITIONER.—The term “petitioner”  
9 means an individual authorized under State or Trib-  
10 al law to petition for an extreme risk protection  
11 order.

12 (7) RESPONDENT.—The term “respondent”  
13 means an individual named in the petition for an ex-  
14 treme risk protection order or subject to an extreme  
15 risk protection order.

16 (8) STATE.—The term “State” means—

17 (A) a State;

18 (B) the District of Columbia;

19 (C) the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico;

20 and

21 (D) any other territory or possession of the  
22 United States.

23 (9) UNIT OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT.—The term  
24 “unit of local government” has the meaning given  
25 the term in section 901 of title I of the Omnibus

1 Crime Control and Safe Streets Act of 1968 (34  
2 U.S.C. 10251).

3 (b) GRANT PROGRAM ESTABLISHED.—

4 (1) IN GENERAL.—The Attorney General shall  
5 establish a program under which, from amounts  
6 made available to carry out this section, the Attor-  
7 ney General may make grants to eligible entities to  
8 assist in carrying out the provisions of the legisla-  
9 tion described in subsection (c).

10 (2) USE OF FUNDS.—Funds awarded under  
11 this subsection may be used by an applicant to—

12 (A) enhance the capacity of law enforce-  
13 ment agencies and the courts of a State, unit  
14 of local government, or Indian Tribe by pro-  
15 viding personnel, training, technical assistance,  
16 data collection, and other resources to carry out  
17 enacted legislation described in subsection (c);

18 (B) train judges, court personnel, health  
19 care and legal professionals, and law enforce-  
20 ment officers to more accurately identify indi-  
21 viduals whose access to firearms poses a danger  
22 of causing harm to themselves or others by in-  
23 creasing the risk of firearms suicide or inter-  
24 personal violence;

1 (C) develop and implement law enforce-  
2 ment and court protocols, forms, and orders so  
3 that law enforcement agencies and the courts  
4 may carry out the provisions of the enacted leg-  
5 islation described in subsection (c) in a safe, eq-  
6 uitable, and effective manner, including through  
7 the removal and storage of firearms pursuant to  
8 extreme risk protection orders under the en-  
9 acted legislation; and

10 (D) raise public awareness and under-  
11 standing of the enacted legislation described in  
12 subsection (c), including through subgrants to  
13 community-based organizations for the training  
14 of community members, so that extreme risk  
15 protection orders may be issued in appropriate  
16 situations to reduce the risk of firearms-related  
17 death and injury.

18 (3) APPLICATION.—An eligible entity desiring a  
19 grant under this subsection shall submit to the At-  
20 torney General an application at such time, in such  
21 manner, and containing or accompanied by such in-  
22 formation as the Attorney General may reasonably  
23 require.

24 (4) TRAINING.—

1 (A) IN GENERAL.—A recipient of a grant  
2 under this subsection shall provide training to  
3 law enforcement officers, including officers of  
4 relevant Federal, State, local, and Tribal law  
5 enforcement agencies, in the safe, impartial, ef-  
6 fective, and equitable use and administration of  
7 extreme risk protection orders, including train-  
8 ing to address—

9 (i) bias based on race and racism, eth-  
10 nicity, gender, sexual orientation, gender  
11 identity, religion, language proficiency,  
12 mental health condition, disability, and  
13 classism in the use and administration of  
14 extreme risk protection orders;

15 (ii) the appropriate use of extreme  
16 risk protection orders in cases of domestic  
17 violence, including the applicability of other  
18 policies and protocols to address domestic  
19 violence in situations that may also involve  
20 extreme risk protection orders and the ne-  
21 cessity of safety planning with the victim  
22 before a law enforcement officer petitions  
23 for and executes an extreme risk protection  
24 order, if applicable;

1 (iii) interacting with persons with a  
2 mental illness or emotional distress, includ-  
3 ing de-escalation and crisis intervention;  
4 and

5 (iv) best practices for referring per-  
6 sons subject to extreme risk protection or-  
7 ders and associated victims of violence to  
8 social service providers that may be avail-  
9 able in the jurisdiction and appropriate for  
10 those individuals, including health care,  
11 mental health, substance abuse, and legal  
12 services, employment and vocational serv-  
13 ices, housing assistance, case management,  
14 and veterans and disability benefits.

15 (B) CONSULTATION WITH EXPERTS.—A  
16 recipient of a grant under this subsection, in  
17 developing law enforcement training required  
18 under subparagraph (A), shall seek advice from  
19 domestic violence service providers (including  
20 culturally specific (as defined in section 40002  
21 of the Violence Against Women Act of 1994 (34  
22 U.S.C. 12291)) organizations), social service  
23 providers, suicide prevention advocates, violence  
24 intervention specialists, law enforcement agen-  
25 cies, mental health disability experts, and other

1 community groups working to reduce suicides  
2 and violence, including domestic violence, within  
3 the State or the territory under the jurisdiction  
4 of the Indian Tribe, as applicable, that enacted  
5 the legislation described in subsection (c) that  
6 enabled the grant recipient to be an eligible en-  
7 tity.

8 (5) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

9 There are authorized to be appropriated such sums  
10 as are necessary to carry out this section.

11 (c) ELIGIBILITY FOR EXTREME RISK PROTECTION  
12 ORDER GRANT PROGRAM.—

13 (1) REQUIREMENTS.—Legislation described in  
14 this subsection is legislation that establishes require-  
15 ments that are substantially similar to the following:

16 (A) PETITION FOR EXTREME RISK PRO-  
17 TECTION ORDER.—A petitioner, including a law  
18 enforcement officer, may submit a petition to a  
19 State or Tribal court, on a form designed by  
20 the court or a State or Tribal agency, that—

21 (i) describes the facts and cir-  
22 cumstances justifying that an extreme risk  
23 protection order be issued against the  
24 named individual; and

1 (ii) is signed by the applicant, under  
2 oath.

3 (B) NOTICE AND DUE PROCESS.—The in-  
4 dividual named in a petition for an extreme risk  
5 protection order as described in subparagraph  
6 (A) shall be given written notice of the petition  
7 and an opportunity to be heard on the matter  
8 in accordance with this paragraph.

9 (C) ISSUANCE OF EXTREME RISK PROTEC-  
10 TION ORDERS.—

11 (i) HEARING.—

12 (I) IN GENERAL.—Upon receipt  
13 of a petition described in subpara-  
14 graph (A) or request of an individual  
15 named in such a petition, the court  
16 shall order a hearing to be held within  
17 a reasonable time, and not later than  
18 30 days after the date of the petition  
19 or request.

20 (II) DETERMINATION.—If the  
21 court finds at the hearing ordered  
22 under subclause (I), by a preponder-  
23 ance of the evidence or according to a  
24 higher evidentiary standard estab-  
25 lished by the State or Indian Tribe,

1 that the respondent poses a danger of  
2 causing harm to self or others by hav-  
3 ing access to a firearm, the court may  
4 issue an extreme risk protection order.

5 (ii) DURATION OF EXTREME RISK  
6 PROTECTION ORDER.—An extreme risk  
7 protection order shall be in effect—

8 (I) until an order terminating or  
9 superseding the extreme risk protec-  
10 tion order is issued; or

11 (II) for a set period of time.

12 (D) EX PARTE EXTREME RISK PROTEC-  
13 TION ORDERS.—

14 (i) IN GENERAL.—Upon receipt of a  
15 petition described in subparagraph (A), the  
16 court may issue an ex parte extreme risk  
17 protection order, if—

18 (I) the petition for an extreme  
19 risk protection order alleges that the  
20 respondent poses a danger of causing  
21 harm to self or others by having ac-  
22 cess to a firearm; and

23 (II) the court finds there is prob-  
24 able cause to believe, or makes a find-  
25 ing according to a higher evidentiary

1 standard established by the State or  
2 Indian Tribe, that the respondent  
3 poses a danger of causing harm to self  
4 or others by having access to a fire-  
5 arm.

6 (ii) DURATION OF EX PARTE EX-  
7 TREME RISK PROTECTION ORDER.—An ex  
8 parte extreme risk protection order shall  
9 remain in effect only until the hearing re-  
10 quired under subparagraph (C)(i).

11 (E) STORAGE OF REMOVED FIREARMS.—

12 (i) AVAILABILITY FOR RETURN.—All  
13 firearms removed or surrendered pursuant  
14 to an extreme risk protection order shall  
15 only be available for return to the named  
16 individual when the individual has regained  
17 eligibility under Federal and State law,  
18 and, where applicable, Tribal law to pos-  
19 sess firearms.

20 (ii) CONSENT REQUIRED FOR DIS-  
21 POSAL OR DESTRUCTION.—Firearms  
22 owned by a named individual may not be  
23 disposed of or destroyed during the period  
24 of the extreme risk protection order with-  
25 out the consent of the named individual.

1 (F) NOTIFICATION.—

2 (i) IN GENERAL.—

3 (I) REQUIREMENT.—A State or  
4 Tribal court that issues an extreme  
5 risk protection order shall notify the  
6 Attorney General or the comparable  
7 State or Tribal agency, as applicable,  
8 of the order as soon as practicable or  
9 within a designated period of time.

10 (II) FORM AND MANNER.—A  
11 State or Tribal court shall submit a  
12 notification under subclause (I) in an  
13 electronic format, in a manner pre-  
14 scribed by the Attorney General or the  
15 comparable State or Tribal agency.

16 (ii) UPDATE OF DATABASES.—As  
17 soon as practicable or within the time pe-  
18 riod designated by State or Tribal law  
19 after receiving a notification under clause  
20 (i), the Attorney General or the com-  
21 parable State or Tribal agency shall ensure  
22 that the extreme risk protection order is  
23 reflected in the National Instant Criminal  
24 Background Check System.

1           (2) ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS.—Legislation de-  
2       scribed in this subsection may—

3           (A) provide procedures for the termination  
4       of an extreme risk protection order;

5           (B) provide procedures for the renewal of  
6       an extreme risk protection order;

7           (C) establish burdens and standards of  
8       proof for issuance of orders described in para-  
9       graph (1) that are substantially similar to or  
10      higher than the burdens and standards of proof  
11      set forth in that paragraph;

12          (D) limit the individuals who may submit  
13      a petition described in paragraph (1), provided  
14      that, at a minimum, 1 or more law enforcement  
15      officers are authorized to do so; and

16          (E) include any other authorizations or re-  
17      quirements that the State or Tribal authorities  
18      determine appropriate.

19          (3) ANNUAL REPORT.—Not later than 1 year  
20      after the date on which an eligible entity receives a  
21      grant under subsection (b), and annually thereafter  
22      for the duration of the grant period, the entity shall  
23      submit to the Attorney General a report that in-  
24      cludes, with respect to the preceding year—

1 (A) the number of petitions for ex parte  
2 extreme risk protection orders filed, as well as  
3 the number of such orders issued and the num-  
4 ber denied, disaggregated by—

5 (i) the jurisdiction;

6 (ii) the individual authorized under  
7 State or Tribal law to petition for an ex-  
8 treme risk protection order, including the  
9 relationship of the individual to the re-  
10 spondent; and

11 (iii) the alleged danger posed by the  
12 respondent, including whether the danger

16 (B) the number of petitions for extreme  
17 risk protection orders filed, as well as the num-

19 nied, disaggregated by—

20 (i) the jurisdiction;

21 (ii) the individual authorized under  
22 State or Tribal law to petition for an ex-  
23 treme risk protection order, including the  
24 relationship of the individual to the re-  
25 spondent; and

1 (iii) the alleged danger posed by the  
2 respondent, including whether the danger  
3 involved a risk of suicide, unintentional in-  
4 jury, domestic violence, or other inter-  
5 personal violence;

6 (C) the number of petitions for renewals of  
7 extreme risk protection orders filed, as well as  
8 the number of such orders issued and the num-  
9 ber denied;

10 (D) the number of cases in which a court  
11 imposed a penalty for false reporting or frivo-  
12 lous petitions;

13 (E) demographic data of petitioners, in-  
14 cluding race, ethnicity, national origin, sex, gen-  
15 der, age, disability, and English language pro-  
16 ficiency, if available;

17 (F) demographic data of respondents, in-  
18 cluding race, ethnicity, national origin, sex, gen-  
19 der, age, disability, and English language pro-  
20 ficiency, if available; and

21 (G) the number of firearms removed, if  
22 available.

1 **SEC. 402. FEDERAL EXTREME RISK PROTECTION ORDERS.**

2 (a) IN GENERAL.—Chapter 44 of title 18, United  
3 States Code, as amended by section 101 of this Act, is  
4 amended by adding at the end the following:

5 **“§ 936. Extreme risk protection orders**

6 “(a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

7 “(1) COURT.—The term ‘court’ means a dis-  
8 trict court of the United States.

9 “(2) DESIGNATED LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFI-  
10 CER.—The term ‘designated law enforcement officer’  
11 means a law enforcement officer, designated by a  
12 United States marshal, who agrees to receive fire-  
13 arms, ammunition, and permit, as applicable, sur-  
14 rendered under subsection (f).

15 “(3) DIRECTOR.—The term ‘Director’ means  
16 the Director of the Administrative Office of the  
17 United States Courts.

18 “(4) EX PARTE EXTREME RISK PROTECTION  
19 ORDER; EX PARTE ORDER.—The term ‘ex parte ex-  
20 treme risk protection order’ or ‘ex parte order’  
21 means an extreme risk protection order issued under  
22 subsection (c).

23 “(5) EXTREME RISK PROTECTION ORDER.—The  
24 term ‘extreme risk protection order’—

25 “(A) means an order issued by a Federal  
26 court under this section, the primary purpose of

1 which is to reduce the risk of firearm-related  
2 death or injury by enjoining an individual from  
3 purchasing, possessing, or receiving, in or af-  
4 fecting interstate and foreign commerce, a fire-  
5 arm or ammunition; and

6 “(B) does not include a domestic violence  
7 protection order, as defined in section 2266.

8 “(6) FAMILY OR HOUSEHOLD MEMBER.—The  
9 term ‘family or household member’, with respect to  
10 a respondent, means any—

11 “(A) parent, spouse, sibling, or child re-  
12 lated by blood, marriage, or adoption to the re-  
13 spondent;

14 “(B) dating partner of the respondent;

15 “(C) individual who has a child in common  
16 with the respondent, regardless of whether the  
17 individual has—

18 “(i) been married to the respondent;

19 or

20 “(ii) lived together with the respond-  
21 ent at any time;

22 “(D) individual who resides or has resided  
23 with the respondent during the past year;

24 “(E) domestic partner of the respondent;

1           “(F) individual who has a legal parent-  
2           child relationship with the respondent, including  
3           a stepparent-stepchild and grandparent-grand-  
4           child relationship; or

5           “(G) individual who is acting or has acted  
6           as the legal guardian of the respondent.

7           “(7) LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER.—The term  
8           ‘law enforcement officer’ means any officer, agent,  
9           or employee of the Federal Government or a State  
10          government, unit of local government, or Indian  
11          tribe (as defined in section 4 of the Indian Self-De-  
12          termination and Education Assistance Act (25  
13          U.S.C. 5304)) authorized—

14          “(A) by law or by a government agency to  
15          engage in or supervise the prevention, detection,  
16          or investigation of any violation of criminal law;  
17          or

18          “(B) by law to supervise sentenced crimi-  
19          nal offenders.

20          “(8) LONG-TERM EXTREME RISK PROTECTION  
21          ORDER; LONG-TERM ORDER.—The term ‘long-term  
22          extreme risk protection order’ or ‘long-term order’  
23          means an extreme risk protection order issued under  
24          subsection (d).

1           “(9) MENTAL HEALTH AGENCY.—The term  
2           ‘mental health agency’ means an agency of a State,  
3           tribal, or local government or its contracted agency  
4           that is responsible for mental health services or co-  
5           occurring mental health and substance abuse serv-  
6           ices.

7           “(10) NATIONAL INSTANT CRIMINAL BACK-  
8           GROUND CHECK SYSTEM.—The term ‘national in-  
9           stant criminal background check system’ means the  
10          national instant criminal background check system  
11          established under section 103 of the Brady Handgun  
12          Violence Prevention Act (34 U.S.C. 40901).

13          “(b) PETITION.—

14               “(1) IN GENERAL.—A family or household  
15               member of the applicable individual, or a law en-  
16               forcement officer, may submit to an appropriate dis-  
17               trict court of the United States a petition requesting  
18               that the court issue an ex parte extreme risk protec-  
19               tion order or long-term extreme risk protection order  
20               with respect to an individual.

21               “(2) NO FEES.—A court may not charge a peti-  
22               tioner any fee for filing a petition under paragraph  
23               (1).

24               “(3) CONFIDENTIALITY.—A petitioner who is a  
25               law enforcement officer may provide the identity of

1 the sources of the petitioner, and any identifying in-  
2 formation, to the court under seal.

3 “(c) EX PARTE ORDERS.—

4 “(1) TIMING.—

5 “(A) IN GENERAL.—Except as provided in  
6 subparagraph (B), a court that receives a peti-  
7 tion for an ex parte order under subsection (b)  
8 shall grant or deny the petition on the date on  
9 which the petition is submitted.

10 “(B) LATE PETITIONS.—If a court receives  
11 a petition for an ex parte order submitted  
12 under subsection (b) too late in the day to per-  
13 mit effective review, the court shall grant or  
14 deny the petition on the next day of judicial  
15 business at a time early enough to permit the  
16 court to file an order with the clerk of the court  
17 during that day.

18 “(2) EVIDENCE REQUIRED.—Before issuing an  
19 ex parte order, a court shall require that the peti-  
20 tioner submit a signed affidavit, sworn to before the  
21 court, that—

22 “(A) explains why the petitioner believes  
23 that the respondent poses a risk of imminent  
24 personal injury to the respondent or another in-

1           dividual, by purchasing, possessing, or receiving  
2           a firearm or ammunition; and

3           “(B) describes the interactions and con-  
4           versations of the petitioner with—

5           “(i) the respondent; or

6           “(ii) another individual, if the peti-  
7           tioner believes that information obtained  
8           from that individual is credible and reli-  
9           able.

10          “(3) STANDARD FOR ISSUANCE OF ORDER.—A  
11          court may issue an ex parte order only upon a find-  
12          ing of probable cause to believe that—

13          “(A) the respondent poses a risk of immi-  
14          nent personal injury to the respondent or an-  
15          other individual, by purchasing, possessing, or  
16          receiving a firearm or ammunition; and

17          “(B) the order is necessary to prevent the  
18          injury described in subparagraph (A).

19          “(4) DURATION.—An ex parte order shall ex-  
20          pire on the earlier of—

21          “(A) the date that is 14 days after the  
22          date of issuance; or

23          “(B) the date on which the court deter-  
24          mines whether to issue a long-term order with  
25          respect to the respondent.

1 “(d) LONG-TERM ORDERS.—

2 “(1) HEARING REQUIRED.—If a court receives  
3 a petition for an extreme risk protection order for a  
4 respondent under subsection (b), the court shall hold  
5 a hearing to determine whether to issue a long-term  
6 order with respect to the respondent either—

7 “(A)(i) except as provided in clause (ii),  
8 not later than 72 hours after the court issues  
9 an ex parte order with respect to the respond-  
10 ent; or

11 “(ii) if the court issues an ex parte order  
12 with respect to the respondent but the order is  
13 not served on the respondent within 72 hours of  
14 the issuance, not later than 72 hours after the  
15 order is served on the respondent; or

16 “(B) if the respondent waives the right to  
17 a hearing under subparagraph (A) or the court  
18 does not issue an ex parte order, not later than  
19 14 days after the date on which the court re-  
20 ceives the petition.

21 “(2) NOTICE AND OPPORTUNITY TO BE  
22 HEARD.—

23 “(A) IN GENERAL.—The court shall pro-  
24 vide the respondent with notice and the oppor-  
25 tunity to be heard at a hearing under this sub-

1 section, sufficient to protect the due process  
2 rights of the respondent.

3 “(B) RIGHT TO COUNSEL.—

4 “(i) IN GENERAL.—At a hearing  
5 under this subsection, the respondent may  
6 be represented by counsel who is—

7 “(I) chosen by the respondent;

8 and

9 “(II) authorized to practice at  
10 such a hearing.

11 “(ii) COURT-PROVIDED COUNSEL.—

12 “(I) IN GENERAL.—If the re-  
13 spondent is financially unable to ob-  
14 tain representation by counsel, the  
15 court, at the request of the res-  
16 pondent, may appoint counsel to represent  
17 the respondent in proceedings under  
18 this subsection.

19 “(II) REASONABLE COMPENSA-  
20 TION.—An attorney appointed pursu-  
21 ant to this subparagraph shall be pro-  
22 vided reasonable attorney’s fees and  
23 expenses.

24 “(3) BURDEN OF PROOF; STANDARD.—At a  
25 hearing under this subsection, the petitioner—

1           “(A) shall have the burden of proving all  
2 material facts; and

3           “(B) shall be required to demonstrate, by  
4 a preponderance of the evidence, that—

5                   “(i) the respondent poses a risk of  
6 personal injury to the respondent or an-  
7 other individual, during the period to be  
8 covered by the proposed extreme risk pro-  
9 tection order, by purchasing, possessing, or  
10 receiving a firearm or ammunition; and

11                   “(ii) the order is necessary to prevent  
12 the injury described in clause (i).

13           “(4) ISSUANCE.—Upon a showing of clear and  
14 convincing evidence under paragraph (3), the court  
15 shall issue a long-term order with respect to the re-  
16 spondent that shall be in effect for a period of not  
17 more than 180 days.

18           “(5) DENIAL.—If the court finds that there is  
19 not clear and convincing evidence to support the  
20 issuance of a long-term order, the court shall dis-  
21 solve any ex parte order then in effect with respect  
22 to the respondent.

23           “(6) RENEWAL.—

24                   “(A) NOTICE OF SCHEDULED EXPIRA-  
25 TION.—Thirty days before the date on which a

1 long-term order is scheduled to expire, the court  
2 that issued the order shall—

3 “(i) notify the petitioner and the re-  
4 spondent that the order is scheduled to ex-  
5 pire; and

6 “(ii) advise the petitioner and the re-  
7 spondent of the procedures for seeking a  
8 renewal of the order under this paragraph.

9 “(B) PETITION.—If a family or household  
10 member of the respondent, or a law enforce-  
11 ment officer, believes that the conditions under  
12 paragraph (3)(B) continue to apply with respect  
13 to a respondent who is subject to a long-term  
14 order, the family or household member or law  
15 enforcement officer may submit to the court  
16 that issued the order a petition for a renewal of  
17 the order.

18 “(C) HEARING.—A court that receives a  
19 petition submitted under subparagraph (B)  
20 shall hold a hearing to determine whether to  
21 issue a renewed long-term order with respect to  
22 the respondent.

23 “(D) APPLICABLE PROCEDURES.—The re-  
24 quirements under paragraphs (2) through (5)  
25 shall apply to the consideration of a petition for

1 a renewed long-term order submitted under  
2 subparagraph (B) of this paragraph.

3 “(E) ISSUANCE.—Upon a showing by clear  
4 and convincing evidence that the conditions  
5 under paragraph (3)(B) continue to apply with  
6 respect to the respondent, the court shall issue  
7 a renewed long-term order with respect to the  
8 respondent.

9 “(e) FACTORS TO CONSIDER.—In determining  
10 whether to issue an extreme risk protection order, a  
11 court—

12 “(1) shall consider factors including—

13 “(A) recent threats, by any medium, or  
14 acts of violence by the respondent directed to-  
15 ward other individuals;

16 “(B) recent threats, by any medium, or  
17 acts of violence by the respondent directed to-  
18 ward the respondent;

19 “(C) recent acts of cruelty to animals by  
20 the respondent;

21 “(D) evidence of ongoing abuse of con-  
22 trolled substances or alcohol by the respondent  
23 that has led to threats or acts of violence di-  
24 rected toward the respondent or other individ-  
25 uals; and

1           “(E) evidence of danger to self or others  
2           transmitted by electronic communications or  
3           publications through social media or net-  
4           working; and

5           “(2) may consider other factors, including—

6           “(A) the reckless use, display, or bran-  
7           dishing of a firearm by the respondent;

8           “(B) a history of violence or attempted vio-  
9           lence by the respondent against other individ-  
10          uals; and

11          “(C) evidence of explicit or implicit threats  
12          made by the person through any medium that  
13          demonstrate that the person poses a risk of per-  
14          sonal injury to the person or others.

15          “(f) RELINQUISHMENT OF FIREARMS AND AMMUNI-  
16          TION.—

17          “(1) ORDER OF SURRENDER.—Upon issuance  
18          of an ex parte order or long-term order, the court  
19          shall order the respondent to surrender all firearms  
20          and ammunition that the respondent possesses or  
21          owns, in or affecting interstate commerce, as well as  
22          any permit authorizing the respondent to purchase  
23          or possess firearms (including a concealed carry per-  
24          mit), to—

1 “(A) the United States Marshals Service;

2 or

3 “(B) a designated law enforcement officer.

4 “(2) SURRENDER AND REMOVAL.—

5 “(A) MANNER OF SERVICE.—

6 “(i) PERSONAL SERVICE.—Except as  
7 provided in clause (ii), a United States  
8 marshal or designated law enforcement of-  
9 ficer shall serve an extreme risk protection  
10 order on a respondent by handing the  
11 order to the respondent.

12 “(ii) ALTERNATIVE SERVICE.—If the  
13 respondent cannot reasonably be located  
14 for service as described in clause (i), an ex-  
15 treme risk protection order may be served  
16 on the respondent in any manner author-  
17 ized under the Federal Rules of Civil Pro-  
18 cedure.

19 “(B) REMOVAL.—Except as provided in  
20 subparagraph (C), a United States marshal or  
21 designated law enforcement officer serving an  
22 extreme risk protection order personally on the  
23 respondent shall—

24 “(i) request that all firearms and am-  
25 munition, in or affecting interstate com-

1 merce, as well as any permit authorizing  
2 the respondent to purchase or possess fire-  
3 arms (including a concealed carry permit),  
4 that the respondent possesses or owns—

5 “(I) be immediately surrendered  
6 to the United States marshal or des-  
7 ignated law enforcement officer; or

8 “(II) at the option of the re-  
9 spondent, be immediately surrendered  
10 and sold to a federally licensed fire-  
11 arms dealer; and

12 “(ii) take possession of all firearms  
13 and ammunition described in clause (i)  
14 that are not sold under subclause (II) of  
15 that clause, as well as any permit de-  
16 scribed in that clause, that are—

17 “(I) surrendered;

18 “(II) in plain sight; or

19 “(III) discovered pursuant to a  
20 lawful search.

21 “(C) ALTERNATIVE SURRENDER.—If a  
22 United States marshal or designated law en-  
23 forcement officer is not able to personally serve  
24 an extreme risk protection order under subpara-  
25 graph (A)(i), or is not reasonably able to take

1 custody of the firearms, ammunition, and per-  
2 mits under subparagraph (B), the respondent  
3 shall surrender the firearms, ammunition, and  
4 permits in a safe manner to the control of a  
5 United States marshal or designated law en-  
6 forcement officer not later than 48 hours after  
7 being served with the order.

8 “(3) RECEIPT.—

9 “(A) ISSUANCE.—At the time of surrender  
10 or removal under paragraph (2), a United  
11 States marshal or designated law enforcement  
12 officer taking possession of a firearm, ammuni-  
13 tion, or a permit pursuant to an extreme risk  
14 protection order shall—

15 “(i) issue a receipt identifying all fire-  
16 arms, ammunition, and permits that have  
17 been surrendered or removed; and

18 “(ii) provide a copy of the receipt  
19 issued under clause (i) to the respondent.

20 “(B) FILING.—Not later than 72 hours  
21 after service of an order under paragraph  
22 (2)(A), the United States marshal who served  
23 the order or designated another law enforce-  
24 ment officer to do so shall—

1           “(i) file the original receipt issued  
2           under subparagraph (A) of this paragraph  
3           with the court that issued the extreme risk  
4           protection order; and

5           “(ii) ensure that the United States  
6           Marshals Service retains a copy of the re-  
7           ceipt.

8           “(C) DESIGNATED LAW ENFORCEMENT  
9           OFFICER.—If a designated law enforcement of-  
10          ficer issues a receipt under subparagraph (A),  
11          the officer shall submit the original receipt and  
12          a copy of the receipt to the appropriate United  
13          States marshal to enable the United States  
14          marshal to comply with subparagraph (B).

15          “(4) FORFEITURE.—If a respondent knowingly  
16          attempts, in violation of an extreme risk protection  
17          order, to access a firearm, ammunition, or a permit  
18          that was surrendered or removed under this sub-  
19          section, the firearm, ammunition, or permit shall be  
20          subject to seizure and forfeiture under section  
21          924(d).

22          “(g) RETURN OF FIREARMS AND AMMUNITION.—

23          “(1) NOTICE.—If an extreme risk protection  
24          order is dissolved, or expires and is not renewed, the

1 court that issued the order shall order the United  
2 States Marshals Service to—

3 “(A) confirm, through the national instant  
4 criminal background check system and any  
5 other relevant law enforcement databases, that  
6 the respondent may lawfully own and possess  
7 firearms and ammunition; and

8 “(B)(i) if the respondent may lawfully own  
9 and possess firearms and ammunition, notify  
10 the respondent that the respondent may re-  
11 trieve each firearm, ammunition, or permit sur-  
12 rendered by or removed from the respondent  
13 under subsection (f); or

14 “(ii) if the respondent may not lawfully  
15 own or possess firearms and ammunition, notify  
16 the respondent that each firearm, ammunition,  
17 or permit surrendered by or removed from the  
18 respondent under subsection (f) will be returned  
19 only when the respondent demonstrates to the  
20 United States Marshals Service that the re-  
21 spondent may lawfully own and possess fire-  
22 arms and ammunition.

23 “(2) RETURN.—If an extreme risk protection  
24 order is dissolved, or expires and is not renewed, and  
25 the United States Marshals Service confirms under

1 paragraph (1)(A) that the respondent may lawfully  
2 own and possess firearms and ammunition, the court  
3 that issued the order shall order the entity that pos-  
4 sesses each firearm, ammunition, or permit surren-  
5 dered by or removed from the respondent under sub-  
6 section (f) to return those items to the respondent.

7 “(h) RETURN OF FIREARMS AND AMMUNITION IM-  
8 PROPERLY RECEIVED.—If a court, in a hearing under  
9 subsection (d), determines that a firearm or ammunition  
10 surrendered by or removed from a respondent under sub-  
11 section (f) is owned by an individual other than the re-  
12 spondent, the court may order the United States marshal  
13 or designated law enforcement officer in possession of the  
14 firearm or ammunition to transfer the firearm or ammuni-  
15 tion to that individual if—

16 “(1) the individual may lawfully own and pos-  
17 sess firearms and ammunition; and

18 “(2) the individual will not provide the respond-  
19 ent with access to the firearm or ammunition.

20 “(i) PENALTY FOR FALSE REPORTING OR FRIVO-  
21 LOUS PETITIONS.—An individual who knowingly submits  
22 materially false information to the court in a petition for  
23 an extreme risk protection order under this section, or who  
24 knowingly files such a petition that is frivolous, unreason-  
25 able, or without foundation, shall be fined not less than

1 \$1,000, in addition to any other penalty authorized by law,  
2 as the court deems necessary to deter such abuse of proc-  
3 ess.

4 “(j) MODEL POLICY.—

5 “(1) IN GENERAL.—The Director shall draft a  
6 model policy to maximize the accessibility of extreme  
7 risk protection orders.

8 “(2) CONTENTS.—In drafting the model policy  
9 under paragraph (1), the Director shall—

10 “(A) ensure that State and local law en-  
11 forcement officers and members of the public  
12 without legal training are able to easily file pe-  
13 titions for extreme risk protection orders;

14 “(B) prescribe outreach efforts by employ-  
15 ees of the district courts of the United States  
16 to familiarize relevant law enforcement officers  
17 and the public with the procedures for filing pe-  
18 titions, either—

19 “(i) through direct outreach; or

20 “(ii) in coordination with—

21 “(I) relevant officials in the exec-  
22 utive or legislative branch of the Fed-  
23 eral Government; or

24 “(II) with State and local offi-  
25 cials;



1                   “(ii) each relevant mental health  
2                   agency in the State in which the order is  
3                   issued; and

4                   “(iii) State and local law enforcement  
5                   officials in the jurisdiction in which the  
6                   order is issued, including the national in-  
7                   stant criminal background check system  
8                   single point of contact for the State of res-  
9                   idence of the respondent, where applicable.

10                  “(B) FORMAT.—A court shall submit a no-  
11                  tice under subparagraph (A) in an electronic  
12                  format, in a manner prescribed by the Attorney  
13                  General.

14                  “(C) UPDATE OF DATABASES.—As soon as  
15                  practicable and not later than 5 days after re-  
16                  ceiving a notice under subparagraph (A), the  
17                  Attorney General shall update the background  
18                  check databases of the Attorney General to re-  
19                  flect the prohibitions articulated in the applica-  
20                  ble extreme risk protection order.

21                  “(2) ANNUAL REPORTS.—Not later than 1 year  
22                  after the date of enactment of the Gun Violence Pre-  
23                  vention and Community Safety Act of 2023, and an-  
24                  nually thereafter, the Director shall submit to the  
25                  Committee on the Judiciary of the Senate and the

1 Committee on the Judiciary of the House of Rep-  
2 resentatives a report that includes, with respect to  
3 the preceding year—

4 “(A) the number of petitions for ex parte  
5 orders filed, as well as the number of such or-  
6 ders issued and the number denied,  
7 disaggregated by—

8 “(i) the jurisdiction;

9 “(ii)(I) whether the individual author-  
10 ized under subsection (b) to petition for a  
11 extreme risk protection order is a law en-  
12 forcement officer or a family or household  
13 member of the respondent; and

14 “(II) if the individual described in  
15 clause (i) is a family or household member  
16 of the respondent, which of subparagraphs  
17 (A) through (G) of subsection (a)(6) de-  
18 scribes the relationship between the indi-  
19 vidual and the respondent; and

20 “(iii) the alleged danger posed by the  
21 respondent, including whether the danger  
22 involved a risk of suicide, unintentional in-  
23 jury, domestic violence, or other inter-  
24 personal violence;

1           “(B) the number of petitions for long-term  
2 orders filed, as well as the number of such or-  
3 ders issued and the number denied,  
4 disaggregated by—

5                   “(i) the jurisdiction;

6                   “(ii)(I) whether the individual author-  
7 ized under subsection (b) to petition for an  
8 extreme risk protection order is a law en-  
9 forcement officer or a family or household  
10 member of the respondent; and

11                   “(II) if the individual described in  
12 subclause (I) is a family or household  
13 member of the respondent, which of sub-  
14 paragraphs (A) through (G) of subsection  
15 (a)(6) describes the relationship between  
16 the individual and the respondent; and

17                   “(iii) the alleged danger posed by the  
18 respondent, including whether the danger  
19 involved a risk of suicide, unintentional in-  
20 jury, domestic violence, or other inter-  
21 personal violence;

22           “(C) the number of petitions for renewals  
23 of long-term orders filed, as well as the number  
24 of such orders issued and the number denied;

1           “(D) the number of cases in which a court  
2           has issued a penalty for false reporting or frivo-  
3           lous petitions;

4           “(E) demographic data of petitioners, in-  
5           cluding race, ethnicity, national origin, sex, gen-  
6           der, age, disability, average annual income, and  
7           English language proficiency, if available;

8           “(F) demographic data of respondents, in-  
9           cluding race, ethnicity, national origin, sex, gen-

11 or slide action, except for a shotgun described in sec-  
12 tion 921(a)(40)(G);

13 “(B) has been rendered permanently inoperable;

14 “(C) is an antique firearm, as defined in section  
15 921 of this title; or

16 “(D) is only capable of firing rimfire ammuni-  
17 tion.

18 “(4) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to—

13 a licensee under title I of the Atomic Energy Act of  
14 1954 (42 U.S.C. 2011 et seq.) for purposes of estab-  
15 lishing and maintaining an on-site physical protec-  
16 tion system and security organization required by  
17 Federal law, or possession by an employee or con-  
18 tractor of such licensee on-site for such purposes or  
19 off-site for purposes of licensee-authorized training  
20 or transportation of nuclear materials;

21           “(E) the possession, by an individual who is re-  
22 tired in good standing from service with a law en-

1           “(i) sold or transferred to the individual by  
2           the agency upon such retirement; or

3           “(ii) that the individual purchased, or oth-

5           tirement;

6           “(F) the importation, sale, manufacture, trans-  
7           fer, or possession of a semiautomatic assault weapon  
8           by a licensed manufacturer or licensed importer for  
9           the purposes of testing or experimentation author-  
10          ized by the Attorney General; or

11          “(G) the importation, sale, manufacture, trans-  
12          fer, or possession of a firearm specified in Appendix  
13          A to this section, as such firearm was manufactured  
14          on the date of introduction of the Gun Violence Pre-  
15          vention and Community Safety Act of 2023.

16          “(5) For purposes of paragraph (4)(C), the term  
17          ‘campus law enforcement officer’ means an individual who  
18          is—

19               “(A) employed by a private institution of higher  
20               education that is eligible for funding under title IV  
21               of the Higher Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C.  
22               1070 et seq.);

23               “(B) responsible for the prevention or investiga-  
24               tion of crime involving injury to persons or property,

1 including apprehension or detention of persons for  
2 such crimes;

3 “(C) authorized by Federal, State, or local law

8 “(6) The Attorney General shall establish and main-  
9 tain, in a timely manner, a record of the make, model,

12 aware has been used in relation to a crime under Federal  
13 or State law, and the nature and circumstances of the  
14 crime involved, including the outcome of relevant criminal  
15 investigations and proceedings. The Attorney General  
16 shall annually submit a copy of the record established  
17 under this paragraph to Congress and make the record  
18 available to the general public.

16 SAULT WEAPONS.—It shall be unlawful for any person,  
17 other than a licensed importer, licensed manufacturer, or  
18 licensed dealer, to store or keep under the dominion or  
19 control of that person any grandfathered semiautomatic  
20 assault weapon that the person knows, or has reasonable  
21 cause to believe, will be accessible to an individual who  
22 is prohibited from receiving or possessing a firearm under  
23 subsection (g), (n), or (x), or any provision of State law,  
24 or to whom the transfer of a firearm is prohibited under

1 section 922(d), unless the grandfathered semiautomatic  
2 assault weapon is—

3 “(1) carried on the person, or within such close

5 use the grandfathered semiautomatic assault weapon  
6 as if the grandfathered semiautomatic assault weap-  
7 on were carried on the person; or

8 “(2) locked by a secure gun storage or safety  
9 device that the prohibited individual has no ability to  
10 access.”.

11 (b) IDENTIFICATION MARKINGS FOR SEMIAUTO-  
12 Matic Assault Weapons.—Section 923(i) of title 18,  
13 United States Code, is amended by adding at the end the  
14 following: “The serial number of any semiautomatic as-  
15 sault weapon manufactured after the date of enactment  
16 of the Gun Violence Prevention and Community Safety  
17 Act of 2023 shall clearly show the date on which the weap-  
18 on was manufactured or made, legibly and conspicuously  
19 engraved or cast on the weapon, and such other identifica-

22 (c) IDENTIFICATION MARKINGS FOR LARGE CAPAC-

1 large capacity ammunition feeding device manufactured  
2 after the date of enactment of the Gun Violence Preven-

19 “(k), (r), (v), or (w)”;

20 (2) in paragraph (2)(C), by inserting “or large  
21 capacity ammunition feeding devices” after “fire-  
22 arms or quantities of ammunition”; and

23 (3) in paragraph (3)(E), by inserting “922(r),  
24 922(v), 922(w),” after “922(n),”.

6           “(3) functional security systems, video moni-  
7           toring, and anti-theft alarms;

8           “(4) functional security gates, strong locks, and  
9           site hardening; and

10           “(5) functional concrete bollards and other ac-  
11           cess controls, if necessary.”.

12           (2) **TRANSITION RULE.**—The regulations pre-  
13           scribed under section 926(d)(1) of title 18, United  
14           States Code, shall not apply to a person who, on the  
15           date of enactment of this Act, is a licensed dealer,  
16           as defined in section 921(a)(11) of title 18, United  
17           States Code, until the earlier of—

18                   (A) the date the person complies with sub-  
19                   section (b)(2) of this section; or

20                   (B) the end of the 1-year period that be-  
21                   gins with the date regulations are prescribed  
22                   under section 926(d) of title 18, United States

24           (b) **SECURITY PLAN SUBMISSION REQUIREMENT**

11           ployee to handle firearms until the employee

15           will be available at any place in which firearms  
16           are sold under the license to persons who are  
17           not licensees (subject to the exception that in  
18           any case in which a secure gun storage or safe-  
19           ty device is temporarily unavailable because of  
20           theft, casualty loss, consumer sales, backorders  
21           from a manufacturer, or any other similar rea-  
22           son beyond the control of the licensee, the deal-  
23           er shall not be considered to be in violation of

3                   “(I) a description of how the applicant  
4                   will secure, in accordance with the regula-  
5                   tions issued under section 926(d), the  
6                   premises from which the applicant will con-

8                   in the event of a natural disaster or other  
9                   emergency); and

10                   “(II) a certification that the appli-  
11                   cant, if issued such a license, the applicant  
12                   will comply with the certification made  
13                   under this subparagraph.”.

14           (2) **TRANSITION RULE.**—A person who, on the  
15           date of enactment of this Act, is a licensed dealer  
16           (as defined in section 921(a)(11) of title 18, United  
17           States Code) and whose license to deal in firearms,  
18           issued under chapter 44 of title 18, will not expire  
19           before the end of the 1-year period beginning on the  
20           date on which regulations are prescribed under sec-  
21           tion 926(d) of title 18, United States Code, shall  
22           submit to the Attorney General a plan of the type  
23           described in section 923(d)(1)(G) of title 18, United

25           period. Any plan so submitted shall be considered to

2 title 18, United States Code, for purposes of sections

5 (c) ANNUAL SECURITY PLAN COMPLIANCE CERTIFI-  
6 CATION REQUIREMENT.—

7 (1) IN GENERAL.—Section 923 of title 18,  
8 United States Code, is amended by adding at the  
9 end the following:

10 “(m)(1) Each licensed dealer shall annually certify to  
11 the Attorney General that each premises from which the  
12 licensed dealer conducts business subject to license under  
13 this chapter is in compliance with the regulations pre-  
14 scribed under section 926(d), and include with the certifi-  
15 cation the results of a reconciliation of the firearms inven-  
16 tory of the licensed dealer with the firearms inventory at  
17 the time of the most recent prior certification (if any)  
18 under this paragraph, including a report of any missing  
19 firearms.

20 “(2) With respect to a violation of paragraph (1), the  
21 Attorney General may, after notice and opportunity for  
22 a hearing—

23 “(A) suspend, until the violation is corrected,  
24 the license issued to the licensee under this chapter  
25 that was used to conduct the firearms transfer; and

1           “(B) impose a civil money penalty of not more  
2           than \$5,000 on a licensed dealer who fails to comply  
3           with paragraph (1).”.

4           (2) **TRANSITION RULE.**—The amendment made  
5           by paragraph (1) of this subsection shall not apply  
6           to a person who, on the date of enactment of this  
7           Act, is a licensed dealer (as defined in section

25          **OTHER LICENSED DEALERS.**—Section 923(g)(1) of title

1 18, United States Code, is amended by adding at the end  
2 the following:

3 “(E)(i) The Attorney General shall, without  
4 such reasonable cause or warrant—

5 “(I) annually inspect or examine the inven-  
6 tory, records, and business premises of each li-  
7 censed dealer whom the Attorney General deter-  
8 mines is a high-risk dealer (based on the con-  
9 siderations used to do so as of the date of the  
10 enactment of this sentence); and

11 “(II) triennially inspect or examine the in-  
12 ventory, records, and business premises of any  
13 other licensed dealer that the Attorney General  
14 determines is not a high-risk dealer.

15 “(ii) Not later than 180 days after the date of  
16 an inspection under this subparagraph reveals a vio-  
17 lation of this section or any regulation prescribed  
18 under this chapter, the Attorney General shall con-  
19 duct an inspection to determine whether such viola-  
20 tion has been cured.”.

21 (c) **AUTHORITY TO HIRE ADDITIONAL INDUSTRY OP-  
22 ERATION INVESTIGATORS FOR ATF.—**

23 (1) **IN GENERAL.—**The Attorney General may  
24 hire 650 industry operation investigators for the Bu-  
25 reau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms, and Explosives,

1 in addition to any personnel needed to carry out this  
2 title and the amendments made by this title.

3 (2) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—

4 There are authorized to be appropriated to the At-  
5 torney General such sums as are necessary to carry  
6 out paragraph (1).

7 **SEC. 703. EMPLOYEE BACKGROUND CHECKS.**

8 (a) BACKGROUND CHECK REQUIRED BEFORE FIRE-  
9 ARM POSSESSION BY DEALER EMPLOYEE.—Section

23 “(B) the system has notified the licensee that  
24 the information available to the system does not  
25 demonstrate that the transfer of a firearm to or re-

1 receipt of a firearm by the individual would violate  
2 subsection (d), (g), or (n) (as applicable) of section  
3 922 or State law.”.

4 (b) BACKGROUND CHECKS REQUIRED BEFORE  
5 ISSUANCE OR RENEWAL OF DEALER LICENSE.—Section  
6 923(e) of title 18, United States Code, is amended by in-  
7 serting after the first sentence the following: “Notwith-  
8 standing the preceding sentence, the Attorney General  
9 may not issue or renew a license to deal in firearms unless  
10 the Attorney General has contacted the national instant  
11 criminal background check system established under sec-  
12 tion 103 of the Brady Handgun Violence Prevention Act  
13 (34 U.S.C. 40901) for information about whether it would  
14 be unlawful for any employee of the applicant for the li-  
15 cense or renewal, identified by the applicant as having the  
16 responsibility to receive a firearm, for information about  
17 whether it would be unlawful for the employee to receive  
18 a firearm, and the system has notified the Attorney Gen-  
19 eral that the information available to the system does not  
20 demonstrate that the transfer of a firearm to or receipt  
21 of a firearm by the employee would violate subsection (d),  
22 (g), or (n) (as applicable) of section 922 or the law of  
23 the State in which the business premises of the applicant  
24 subject to the license is located.”.

1 (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made by  
2 this section shall take effect on the date that is 1 year  
3 after the date of enactment of this Act.

4 **SEC. 704. GUN STORE THEFTS.**

5 Section 923(g)(6) of title 18, United States Code, is  
6 amended—

7 (1) by inserting “(A)” after “(6)”; and

8 (2) by adding at the end the following:

9 “(B)(i) Not later than 30 days after the date on  
10 which the Attorney General receives a report from a li-  
11 censed dealer pursuant to subparagraph (A) of this para-  
12 graph of the theft of a firearm, the Attorney General shall  
13 conduct an independent inspection of the security of the  
14 premises at which the theft occurred, which may include  
15 an inspection of the measures taken to implement the se-  
16 curity plan submitted by the licensed dealer pursuant to  
17 subsection (d)(1)(G).

18 “(ii) On completion of the security inspection, the At-  
19 torney General shall provide the licensed dealer with—

20 “(I) a notice of any violation by the licensed  
21 dealer of any security requirements prescribed under  
22 section 926(d); and

23 “(II) recommendations for improving security  
24 of the premises involved.

1           “(iii) Not later than 180 days after the date on which  
2 the Attorney General conducts an investigation under this  
3 subparagraph that reveals a violation of any security re-  
4 quirement prescribed under section 926(d), the Attorney  
5 General shall conduct another investigation to determine  
6 whether the violation has been cured.”.

7 **SEC. 705. CIVIL ENFORCEMENT.**

8           Section 923 of title 18, United States Code, as  
9 amended by section 701(c)(1) of this Act, is amended by  
10 adding at the end the following:

11           “(n) In the case of a licensed dealer who the Attorney  
12 General has found to be in violation of a regulation pre-  
13 scribed under this chapter, to not have implemented a cor-  
14 rective action required by the Attorney General at the  
15 completion of a security inspection conducted under sub-  
16 section (g)(6)(B)(i) of this section within 30 days after  
17 the date of the inspection, or to be in violation of sub-  
18 section (g)(8) of this section—

19                   “(1) the Attorney General shall—

20                           “(A) if the violation is not a result of gross  
21 negligence by the licensed dealer—

22                                   “(i) in the case of the first such viola-  
23 tion of the law or regulation by the li-  
24 censed dealer, if not preceded by a viola-  
25 tion to which subparagraph (B) applies,

1 transmit to the licensed dealer a written  
2 notice specifying the violation, which shall  
3 include a copy of the provision of law or  
4 regulation violated and a plan for how to  
5 cure the violation;

6 “(ii) in the case of the second such  
7 violation by the licensed dealer, if not pre-  
8 ceded by a violation to which subparagraph  
9 (B) applies, impose a civil money penalty  
10 in an amount that is not less than \$2,500  
11 and not more than \$20,000;

12 “(iii) in the case of the third such vio-  
13 lation by the licensed dealer, if not pre-  
14 ceded by a violation to which subparagraph  
15 (B) applies, suspend the license to deal in  
16 firearms issued to the licensed dealer  
17 under this chapter until the violation  
18 ceases;

19 “(iv) in the case of the fourth such  
20 violation by the licensed dealer, whether or  
21 not preceded by a violation to which sub-  
22 paragraph (B) applies, revoke that license;  
23 or

24 “(v) in the case of any such violation  
25 by the licensed dealer, if preceded by a vio-



1 subsection that is 1 or 2 levels greater in  
2 severity than the level of severity of the  
3 penalty most recently applied to the li-  
4 censed dealer under this subsection; and

5 “(2) in the case of any such violation, if the At-  
6 torney General finds that the nature of the violation  
7 indicates that the continued operation of a firearms  
8 business by the licensed dealer presents an imminent  
9 risk to public safety, the Attorney General shall, not-  
10 withstanding paragraph (1), immediately suspend  
11 the license to deal in firearm issued to the licensed  
12 dealer under this chapter and secure the firearms in-  
13 ventory of the licensed dealer, until the violation  
14 ceases.”.

15 **SEC. 706. NO EFFECT ON STATE LAWS GOVERNING DEAL-**  
16 **ING IN FIREARMS.**

17 Nothing in this title shall be interpreted to preclude  
18 a State from imposing or enforcing any requirement relat-

2 or loss of the firearm, not later than 48 hours after the  
3 owner becomes aware of the theft or loss, to the Attorney  
4 General and to the appropriate local authorities.”.

5           (b) CIVIL PENALTY.—Section 924 of title 18, United  
6 States Code, is amended by adding at the end the fol-  
7 lowing:

8           “(q) Whoever violates section 922(gg) shall be fined  
9 not more than \$1,000 in a civil proceeding.”.

10 **SEC. 708. REPORT ON IMPLEMENTATION.**

11           Not later than 2 years after the date of enactment

### 10 **SEC. 802. REPEAL OF EXCLUSION OF PISTOLS, REVOLVERS,**

11 **AND OTHER FIREARMS FROM CONSUMER**

12 **PRODUCT SAFETY LAWS.**

13 (a) AMENDING THE DEFINITION OF CONSUMER  
14 PRODUCT.—Section 3(a)(5) of the Consumer Product  
15 Safety Act (15 U.S.C. 2052(a)(5)) is amended—

16 (1) by striking subparagraph (E);

17 (2) by redesignating subparagraphs (F)  
18 through (I) as subparagraphs (E) through (H), re-  
19 spectively; and

20 (3) in the matter following subparagraph (H)  
21 (as redesignated by paragraph (2)), by striking “de-  
22 scribed in subparagraph (E) of this paragraph or”.

23 (b) REMOVING PROHIBITION OF RULEMAKING AU-  
24 THORITY.—Subsection (e) of section 3 of the Consumer

1 Product Safety Commission Improvements Act of 1976  
2 (15 U.S.C. 2080 note) is repealed.

3 **SEC. 803. INCREASE IN EXCISE TAXES RELATING TO FIRE-**  
4 **ARMS.**

5 (a) IN GENERAL.—Section 4181 of the Internal Rev-  
6 enue Code of 1986 is amended to read as follows:

7 **“SEC. 4181. IMPOSITION OF TAX.**

8 “There is hereby imposed upon the sale by the manu-  
9 facturer, producer, or importer of the following articles a  
10 tax equivalent to the specified percent of the price for  
11 which so sold:

12 “(1) Articles taxable at 30 percent:

13 “(A) Pistols.

14 “(B) Revolvers.

15 “(C) Firearms (other than pistols and re-  
16 volvers).

17 “(D) Any lower frame or receiver for a  
18 firearm, whether for a semiautomatic pistol,  
19 rifle, or shotgun that is designed to accommo-  
20 date interchangeable upper receivers.

21 “(2) Articles taxable at 50 percent: Shells and  
22 cartridges.”.

23 (b) EXEMPTION FOR UNITED STATES.—Subsection  
24 (b) of section 4182 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986  
25 is amended to read as follows:

1       “(b) SALES TO UNITED STATES.—No firearms, pis-  
2 tols, revolvers, lower frame or receiver for a firearm,  
3 shells, and cartridges purchased with funds appropriated  
4 for any department, agency, or instrumentality of the  
5 United States shall be subject to any tax imposed on the  
6 sale or transfer of such articles.”.

7       (c) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made by  
8 this section shall apply with respect to sales made during  
9 any fiscal year beginning after the date of enactment of  
10 this Act.

11       (d) USE OF INCREASED TAXES.—

12           (1) USE FOR GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION AND  
13 RESEARCH.—An amount equal to 39 percent of reve-  
14 nues accruing from any tax imposed on shells and  
15 cartridges by section 4181 of the Internal Revenue  
16 Code of 1986, shall, subject to the exemptions in  
17 section 4182 of such Code, be covered into the Com-  
18 munity Violence Intervention Fund in the Treasury  
19 (hereinafter referred to as the “Fund”) and is au-  
20 thorized to be appropriated and made available until  
21 expended to carry out the purposes of paragraph  
22 (2).

23           (2) PROGRAMS FOR GUN VIOLENCE PREVEN-  
24 TION AND RESEARCH.—Amounts in the Fund estab-  
25 lished under paragraph (1) shall be used by the Sec-

1       retary of Health and Human Services to carry out  
2       the program established under section 399V–8 of  
3       the Public Health Service Act (as added by section  
4       901 of this Act).

5               (3) CONFORMING AMENDMENT.—

6                       (A) IN GENERAL.—Section 3(a)(1) of the  
7       Pittman-Robertson Wildlife Restoration Act (16  
8       U.S.C. 669b(a)(1)) is amended by inserting  
9       “(other than 39 percent of the revenues accru-  
10      ing from the taxes imposed on shells and car-  
11      tridges by section 4181 of such Code)” after  
12      “Internal Revenue Code of 1986”.

13                      (B) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment  
14      made by this paragraph shall apply with respect

17 **SEC. 804. DISCOVERABILITY AND ADMISSIBILITY OF GUN**

25      and may be used, relied on, or disclosed in any manner,

1 and testimony or other evidence may be permitted based  
2 on the data, on the same basis as other information, in  
3 a civil action in any State (including the District of Co-  
4 lumbia) or Federal court or in an administrative pro-  
5 ceeding.

6 **TITLE IX—RESEARCH AND COM-**  
7 **MUNITY VIOLENCE INTER-**  
8 **VENTION PROGRAM**

9 **SEC. 901. COMMUNITY VIOLENCE INTERVENTION GRANT**  
10 **PROGRAM.**

11 Part P of title III of the Public Health Service Act  
12 (42 U.S.C. 280g et seq.) is amended by adding at the end  
13 the following:

14 **“SEC. 399V-8. COMMUNITY VIOLENCE INTERVENTION**  
15 **GRANT PROGRAM.**

16 “(a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall award  
17 grants to eligible entities to support community violence  
18 intervention programs, with an emphasis on evidence-in-  
19 formed prevention and intervention strategies to reduce  
20 homicides, shootings, and group-related violence.

21 “(b) ELIGIBLE ENTITIES.—

22 “(1) IN GENERAL.—To be eligible for a grant  
23 under this section, an entity shall—

1           “(A) be a local governmental entity, a hos-  
2           pital, or a nonprofit, community-based organi-  
3           zation; and

4           “(B) submit an application at such time,  
5           but not more frequently than biennially, in such  
6           manner, and containing such information as the  
7           Secretary may require, including—

8                   “(i) clearly defined and measurable  
9                   objectives for the grant;

10                   “(ii) a statement describing how the  
11                   applicant proposes to use the grant to im-  
12                   plement an evidence-informed violence re-  
13                   duction initiative in accordance with this  
14                   section;

15                   “(iii) evidence indicating that the pro-  
16                   posed violence reduction initiative would  
17                   likely reduce the incidence of homicides,  
18                   shootings, and group-related violence; and

19                   “(iv) any other information the Sec-  
20                   retary may require.

21           “(2) **REQUIRED DISTRIBUTION.**—Each local  
22           governmental entity that receives a grant shall dis-  
23           tribute not less than 50 percent of the grant funds  
24           to one or more of any of the following types of enti-  
25           ties:

1                   “(A) A community-based organization.

2                   “(B) A nonprofit organization.

3                   “(C) A public agency or department, other  
4                   than a law enforcement agency or department,  
5                   that is primarily dedicated to community safety  
6                   or violence prevention.

7           “(c) PROGRAM ACTIVITIES.—A program supported  
8 by a grant under this section—

9                   “(1) shall focus on interrupting cycles of vio-  
10                  lence by focusing prevention and intervention re-  
11                  sources on the individuals identified as being at  
12                  highest risk for being victims or perpetrators of  
13                  community violence in the near future; and

14                  “(2) shall be used to support, expand, and rep-  
15                  licate evidence-informed violence reduction initia-  
16                  tives, including—

17                         “(A) hospital-based violence intervention  
18                         programs;

19                         “(B) evidence-informed street outreach  
20                         programs;

21                         “(C) focused deterrence strategies;

22                         “(D) conflict mediation;

23                         “(E) delivery of needs-based support serv-  
24                         ices for high-risk individuals and their family  
25                         members; and

1           “(F) providing intensive case management,  
2           counseling or peer support services that reduce  
3           individuals’ risk of being victimized by, or per-  
4           petrating, violence and that seek to interrupt  
5           cycles of violence and retaliation in order to re-  
6           duce the incidence of homicides, shootings, and  
7           group-related violence.

8           “(d) PRIORITY.—In awarding grants under this sec-  
9           tion, the Secretary shall give priority to programs oper-  
10          ating in—

11           “(1) the 127 municipalities that have had the  
12          highest annual per capita homicide rates as meas-  
13          ured over the most recent 5 years (among munici-  
14          palities meeting certain population thresholds, as  
15          specified by the Secretary); and

16           “(2) other municipalities with substantial recent  
17          increases in homicide rates, based on homicide data  
18          reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation, or  
19          as otherwise specified by the Secretary.

20           “(e) GRANT RECIPIENT REPORTS.—Each recipient  
21          of a grant under this section shall submit a biennial per-  
22          formance report to the Secretary detailing how such grant  
23          funds were used and the progress made towards address-  
24          ing violence in the community during the applicable fund-  
25          ing period under the grant.

1       “(f) REPORTS TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 2  
2 years after the date on which the program under this sec-  
3 tion commences, and every 2 years thereafter, the Sec-  
4 retary shall submit a report to Congress detailing how  
5 funds appropriated for the grant program under this sec-  
6 tion were used and recommendations for improvement of  
7 the program.

8       “(g) AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.—There  
9 are authorized to be appropriated to the Secretary to carry  
10 out this section \$120,000,000 for each fiscal year.”.

11 **SEC. 902. FUNDING FOR RESEARCH ON FIREARMS SAFETY**  
12 **OR GUN VIOLENCE PREVENTION.**

13       (a) DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE.—

14           (1) IN GENERAL.—There are authorized to be  
15 appropriated to the Attorney General \$60,000,000  
16 for each fiscal year for the purpose of conducting or  
17 supporting research on firearms safety or gun vio-  
18 lence prevention. The amount authorized to be ap-  
19 propriated by the preceding sentence is in addition  
20 to any other amounts authorized to be appropriated  
21 for such purpose.

22           (2) REPORTS TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 2  
23 years after the date of enactment of this Act, and  
24 every 2 years thereafter, the Attorney General shall  
25 submit a report to Congress detailing how the funds

1 authorized to be appropriated under this section  
2 were used.

3 (b) DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERV-  
4 ICES.—

5 (1) IN GENERAL.—There are authorized to be  
6 appropriated to the Secretary of Health and Human  
7 Services \$60,000,000 for each fiscal year for the  
8 purpose of conducting or supporting research on  
9 firearms safety or gun violence prevention, including  
10 conducting evaluations of the community violence  
11 intervention grant program authorized under section  
12 399V–8 of the Public Health Service Act (as added  
13 by section 901 of this Act). The amount authorized  
14 to be appropriated by the preceding sentence is in  
15 addition to any other amounts authorized to be ap-  
16 propriated for such purpose.

17 (2) REPORTS TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 2  
18 years after the date of enactment of this Act, and  
19 every 2 years thereafter, the Secretary of Health  
20 and Human Services shall submit a report to Con-  
21 gress detailing how the funds authorized to be ap-  
22 propriated under this section were used.

2   **SEC. 1001. INCLUSION OF SEMIAUTOMATIC ASSAULT WEAP-**  
3                   **ONS AS FIREARMS UNDER NATIONAL FIRE-**  
4                   **ARMS ACT.**

5           (a) AMENDMENTS TO TITLE 18, UNITED STATES  
6 CODE.—

7           (1) IN GENERAL.—Section 922(v)(2) of title 18,  
8 United States Code, as added by section 512 of this  
9 Act, is amended—

10                   (A) by striking “weapon otherwise law-  
11 fully” and inserting the following: “weapon—

12                           “(A) otherwise lawfully”;

13                   (B) by striking the period at the end and  
14 inserting “; and”; and

15                   (C) by adding at the end the following:

16                           “(B) registered under the National Fire-  
17 arms Act.”.

18           (2) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendments made  
19 by this subsection shall take effect on the date that  
20 is 1 year after the date of enactment of this Act.

21           (b) AMENDMENTS TO INTERNAL REVENUE CODE OF  
22 1986.—

23           (1) IN GENERAL.—Section 5845(a) of the In-  
24 ternal Revenue Code of 1986 is amended by striking  
25 “and (8) a destructive device” and inserting “(8) a

1 destructive device; and (9) a semiautomatic assault  
2 weapon (as defined in section 921(a) of title 18,  
3 United States Code) lawfully possessed on the date  
4 of enactment of the Gun Violence Prevention and  
5 Community Safety Act of 2023”.

6 (2) EFFECTIVE DATE.—

7 (A) IN GENERAL.—Subject to subpara-  
8 graph (B), the amendments made by this sub-  
9 section shall take effect on the date which is 12  
10 months after the date of enactment of this Act.

11 (B) REGISTRATION.—

12 (i) IN GENERAL.—Notwithstanding  
13 subparagraph (A) or any other provision of  
14 law, any person possessing a semiauto-  
15 matic assault weapon (as defined in section  
16 921(a) of title 18, United States Code)  
17 which is not registered to such person in  
18 the National Firearms Registration and  
19 Transfer Record shall register each such  
20 weapon so possessed with the Secretary in  
21 such form and manner as the Secretary  
22 may require within the 12-month period  
23 immediately following the date of enact-  
24 ment of this Act.

1 (ii) INCLUSION IN REGISTRY.—Any  
2 registration described in clause (i) shall be-  
3 come a part of the National Firearms Reg-  
4 istration and Transfer Record.

5 (C) DEFINITIONS.—In this paragraph:

6 (i) NATIONAL FIREARMS REGISTRA-  
7 TION AND TRANSFER RECORD.—The term  
8 “National Firearms Registration and  
9 Transfer Record” means the registry es-  
10 tablished pursuant to section 5841 of the  
11 Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

12 (ii) SECRETARY.—The term “Sec-  
13 retary” has the same meaning given such  
14 term under section 7701(a)(11)(B) of the  
15 Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

16 **SEC. 1002. SEVERABILITY.**

17 If any provision of this Act or any amendment made  
18 by this Act, or any application of such provision or amend-  
19 ment to any person or circumstance, is held to be invalid,  
20 the remainder of the provisions of this Act and the amend-  
21 ments made by this Act and the application of the provi-  
22 sion or amendment to any other person or circumstance  
23 shall not be affected.
